19 AN ACT Authorizing the Acceptance of Federal
20 Block Grants and Making Allocations
21 from the Federal Block Grants for the
22 Expenditures of State Government.

24 Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis-
25 lature do not become effective until 90 days after
26 adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

27 Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate un-
28 til after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

29 Whereas, certain obligations and expenses inci-
30 dent to the operation of state departments and insti-
31 tutions will become due and payable immediately; and

32 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature,
33 these facts create an emergency within the meaning of
34 the Constitution of Maine and require the following
35 legislation as immediately necessary for the preser-

1 vation of the public peace, health and safety; now,
2 therefore,

3 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as
4 follows:

5 PART A

6 Authorization. In accordance with the Maine Re-
7 vised Statutes, Title 5, section 1670, the State is
8 authorized to accept federal block grants in the fol-
9 lowing amounts.
