26 27 28 29	Until the first Wednesday of January 1987, the Governor shall receive an annual salary of \$35,000. Beginning the first Wednesday of January 1987, the Governor shall receive an annual salary of \$60,000.	
30 31 32	The annual salary of the Governor shall be re- viewed in the 3rd year of each gubernatorial term in office by the State Compensation Commission.

Salary, expenses and travel of Members of the Legislature and representatives of Indian tribes 28 29 Each member of the Senate and House of Represen-30 tatives, beginning with the first Wednesday of Decem-31 ber, 1984 and thereafter, shall receive \$7,500 \$9,000 in the first year and \$4,000 \$5,000 in the 2nd year 32 of each biennium, and shall be paid for travel at 33 each legislative session once each week at the same 34 35 rate per mile to and from his place of abode as state employees receive, the mileage to be determined by 36 37 the most reasonable direct route, except that Legis-

lators may be reimbursed for tolls paid for travel on

11 The first regular session of the Legislature, af-12 ter its convening, shall adjourn no later than the 13 3rd Wednesday in June and the 2nd regular session of 14 the Legislature shall adjourn no later than the 3rd 15 Wednesday in April. The Legislature, in case of 16 emergency, may by a vote of 2/3 of the members of 17 each House present and voting, extend the date for 18 adjournment for the first or 2nd regular session by 19 no more than 5 legislative days, and in case of fur-20 ther emergency, may by a vote of 2/3 of the members 21 of each House present and voting, further extend the 22 date for adjournment by 5 additional legislative 23 days. The times for adjournment for the first and 2nd 24 regular sessions may also be extended for one additional legislative day for the purpose of considering 25 26 possible objections of the Governor to any bill or 27 resolution presented to him by the Legislature under 28 the Constitution, Article IV, Part Third, Section 2.

29 Each member of the Senate and House of Represen-30 tatives shall be entitled to a meal allowance in the 31 amount of \$26 and a housing allowance in the amount 32 of \$24 \$30 for each day in attendance at sessions of 33 the Legislature and for each day he occupies over-34 night accommodations away from home either immediate-35 ly preceding or immediately following attendance at 36 daily sessions of the Legislature. In lieu of the 37 meal and housing allowance, each member shall be en-38 titled to a daily meal allowance in the amount of \$26 39 daily mileage allowances in an amount up and actual 40 to but not exceeding \$24 \$30 per day. Each member 41 also receive an annual allowance for constitushall 42 ent services in the amount of \$330 \$400.

43 Each member of the Senate and House of Represen-44 tatives shall be reimbursed for actual regular

1 airfare expenses from his place of abode to Augusta 2 for one trip each week when the Legislature is in 3 regular session and, when the Legislature is not in 4 regular session, for days when meetings or daily ses-5 sions are held, provided that the distance from his 6 place of abode to Augusta is more than 150 miles, the 7 mileage is determined by the most reasonable direct 8 route and reimbursement shall be capped at commercial 9 flight rates

10 The President of the Senate and the Speaker of 11 the House of Representatives shall receive an addi-12 tional 50% above regular compensation, the majority and minority leaders of the Senate and House of Rep-13 14 resentatives shall receive an additional 25% above regular compensation and the assistant majority and 15 minority leaders of the Senate and House of Represen-16 17 tatives shall receive an additional 12 1/2% above 18 regular compensation.

19 In addition to the salary paid for the first and 20 2nd regular sessions of the Legislature, when a spe-21 cial session is called, the members of the Senate and 22 House of Representatives shall each be paid \$50 \$55 23 for every day's attendance, expenses and mileage as 24 aforesaid.

No additional expenses shall may be paid to Legislators from the Legislative Account unless authorized by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House of Representatives during any regular session.

30 The member of the Penobscot Indian Tribe and the 31 member of the Passamaquoddy Indian Tribe elected to represent his tribe at the Legislature shall receive 32 33 a compensation of \$77 \$80 for each day's attendance during the first and 2nd regular sessions and 34 allow-35 for meals, constituent service, housing and ance travel expenses as any other member of the Senate and 36 House of Representatives for attendance at each leg-37 38 islative session. 35 a member of the Legislature dies or otherwise If 36 vacates the office, the successor is entitled to а 37 salary from the date of seating, computed as follows: 38 One hundred and fifty eighty dollars per week times 39 the number of weeks remaining in the calendar year if 40 the vacancy occurs in the first year and \$80 \$100 per 41 week for the number of weeks remaining in the calen-42 dar year if the vacancy occurs in the 2nd year.

Sec. 6. 3 MRSA §2-A, sub-§1, as amended by PL 1983, c. 812, §2 and c. 853, Pt. D, §§1 and 2, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

4 1. State Compensation Commission established. There is established the State Compensation Commis-5 6 sion, to consist of 5 members appointed in January of every odd-numbered year as follows: One member shall 7 8 be appointed by the President of the Senate; one mem-9 ber shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; one member shall be appointed by the 10 11 Senate Minority Leader; one member shall be appointed 12 by the House Minority Leader; and one member shall be appointed by a majority of the preceding 4 commis-13 14 sioners and shall serve as chairman of the commission. The 5 members shall be residents of the State, 15 16 appointed from the public. No one may be appointed 17 who is a Legislator at the time of his appointment.

18 All members shall be appointed for terms to coincide 19 with the legislative biennium. Vacancies shall be 20 filled in the same manner as the original appoint-21 ments for the balance of the unexpired term. The 22 commission shall be appointed in January at the First 23 Regular Session of each Legislature.

24 The commission may request staff support from the 25 Legislative Council.

2. Duties of commission. Not later than May 1st 31 32 of every odd-numbered year and January 15th of every 33 even-numbered year, the commission shall submit to the Legislature an interim report of the commission 34 and not later than November 15th of every even-35 numbered year, a final report of the commission. 36 The 37 reports shall contain: A description of the commission's activities; the recommendations of the commis-38 sion; the reasons for its recommendations; drafts of 39 40 any legislation required to implement its recommenda-41 tions; and any other material that commission members 42 may wish to submit.

1 Prior to reporting as required in this subsection, 2 and subsequent to giving public notice, the commis-3 sion shall hold a public hearing on the report. Sub-4 sequent to reporting, the commission shall meet, if 5 requested, with the Governor, the Legislative Council 6 and legislative committees to discuss the report.

7 The report shall contain recommendations for: All compensation of the Governor, justices and judges, 8 9 constitutional officers, Legislators, Clerk and As-10 sistant Clerk of the House of Representatives, Secre-11 tary and Assistant Secretary of the Senate and repre-12 sentatives of Indian tribes, including, but not lim-13 ited to, all payments for salaries, meals, housing, travel, mileage, constituent services and all other 14 15 expenses and allowances, including additional pay-16 ments made for additional services by any justice, 17 judge, constitutional officer, President of the Sen-18 ate, Speaker of the House of Representatives and mem-19 bers of legislative leadership. Any member who has com-33 pleted at least 25 years of creditable service, as a 34 judge, may retire any time before his 60th birthday. 35 The retirement allowance shall be determined in ac-36 cordance with section 1352, except that it shall be reduced by multiplying the retirement allowance by a 37 38 fraction which represents the ratio of the amount of 39 а life annuity due at age 60 to the amount of a life 40 annuity due at the age of retirement. Sec. 14. Effective dates. Sections 2, 3 and 4
of this Act shall be effective on July 1, 1986. All
other sections of this Act shall be effective 90 days
after adjournment of the Legislature.

FISCAL NOTE

20 1 of this bill requires a \$5,000 General Section 21 Fund appropriation in fiscal year 1986-87 to fund а salary increase for the Governor. Sections 2 and 3 22 require a \$13,980 General Fund appropriation in fis-23 2.4cal year 1986-87 to fund a salary increase for the 3 25 Public Utilities Commission commissioners. Section 4 26 requires a \$58,340 General Fund appropriation to fund 27 the fiscal year 1986-87 salary increase for the 9 28 Workers' Compensation commissioners. Sections 5 and 29 12 enact salary and expense increases for Legislators 30 and will require a \$526,800 General Fund appropria-31 tion in fiscal year 1986-87. Sections 6 to 11 will 32 have no significant fiscal impact.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This new draft makes the following changes to the bill:

1 1. Increases the Governor's salary to \$60,000, 2 effective January 1987, rather than the proposed 3 \$70,000;

4 2. Increases Legislators' salaries to \$5,000 in 5 the Second Regular Session, rather than the proposed 6 \$6,000;

7 3. Increases Legislators' housing and mileage 8 allowance to \$30 per day, rather than the proposed 9 \$34 per day;

10 4. Increases the constituent service allowance 11 to \$400, rather than the proposed \$500;

12 5. Amends the proposed air fare reimbursement 13 for Legislators by capping the reimbursement to com-14 mercial air fare rates;

15 6. Increases the Indian Representative compensa-16 tion to \$80 per day, rather than the proposed \$100 17 per day;

18 7. Amends the manner in which members of the
19 State Compensation Commission are appointed to allow
20 the Senate Minority Leader and House Minority Leader
21 to each appoint one member;

8. Clarifies the language concerning the minimum retirement benefit for judges in the transition zone to ensure that cost-of-living adjustments are not added to the retirement benefit twice;

9. Allows Legislators' health insurance premiums
 for dependent coverage to be reduced from 100% to
 50%; and

29 10. Changes the appropriation section according-30 ly.
