20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

23	§75-A. Affordable telephone service
24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31	1. Certificates of public necessity and convenience. The commission may not award a certificate of public necessity and convenience to intrastate long distance carriers, allow the provision of coin telephone service by entities other than duly certificated telephone utilities, or allow the resale of any local or long distance service, unless it determines that the effect of that action will not increase the cost of residential local telephone services.

vice or local coin telephone service or have the effect of reducing the number and geographic distribution of coin telephone provided by a telephone company.

- 2. Deregulation and deaveraging. The commission may not deregulate the provision of message toll service or approve any tariffs for message toll service which provide for a different rate for toll calls made between any 2 exchanges which are equally distant. The commission shall require all facility-based interexchange carriers permitted to operate in the State to provide originating message toll service from all offices equipped for equal access.
- 3. Carrier bypass. The commission may not permit interexchange carriers to provide service directly to end users either by building facilities directly to the customer location or by connecting to a customer-provided facility, going from the customer's location to the interexchange carrier's point of presence. In the event interexchange competition is permitted, all access to interexchange carrier facilities shall be provided by the local exchange companies.
- 4. Wide Area Telephone Service or WATS. The commission shall require that any rate differences between Wide Area Telephone Service or WATS, private line and Intrastate Message Toll Service or MTS rates be based on actual cost difference. The contribution for each minute toward Nontraffic Sensitive or NTS cost for MTS, WATS and private line may not be different, unless some deviation is necessary to avoid the loss of the customer. Where a rate deviation is necessary, it shall be targeted specifically to that customer, or class of customers, and not to telephone ratepayers in general.
- 5. Intrastate carrier access charges. Intrastate carrier access charges shall be structured in a manner such that the NTS contribution from that service is the same as that coming from toll services provided by a local exchange carrier.

2	This bill requires the Public Utilities Commis-
3	sion to consider the effect of competition on local
4	telephone rates and to take no procompetitive steps
5	if such action will result in higher local rates.
6	The bill also prohibits long-distance rate
7	deregulation and rate deaveraging. Rate deaveraging
8	will cause long-distance rates within the State to
9	stop being uniform throughout the State. The bill
10	also prohibits carrier bypass of the existing tele-
11	phone network. Finally, this bill requires the com-
12	mission to maintain the same relationships, for all
13	services, of costs to rates so that any provision of
14	service by entities other than local telephone compa-
15	nies will minimize upward pressure on local rates.

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
