20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22	Sec. 1. 21-A MRSA §810 is enacted to read:
23	§810. Approval of voting devices
24 25 26 27 28 29	The Secretary of State may make reasonable regulations governing the use and type of voting devices and voting systems. The types of voting devices may be limited to minimize the cost of producing ballot materials or to limit voter confusion with differing systems.

30 31 Sec. 2. 21-A MRSA $\S 841$, sub- $\S 6$, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 161, $\S 6$, is amended to read:

6. Electronic voting system. "Electronic voting system" means a system in which votes are recorded on paper ballots utilizing special marking devices or on ballot cards utilizing special styluses as part of a voting device and these votes are subsequently counted and tabulated by automatic tabulating equipment at one or more counting centers.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purposes of this bill are as follows.

Section 1. Currently, all voting devices meeting the technical requirements of the law must be approved. This may result in a large variety of devices being approved, thus increasing the cost of preparing specialized ballot forms and causing confusion for voters who move from one municipality to another. Limiting the variety of these devices should minimize these problems.

Section 2. Some new electronic voting systems do not require "special marking devices" and this will not be approved for use in state elections even though that may be desirable.
