## STATEMENT OF FACT

 The Older American Volunteer Programs in Maine are 6 Retired Senior Volunteer Programs, 2 Foster Grandparent Programs and one Senior Companion Program. These programs have developed expertise in providing services in these many areas of basic human needs, including in-home volunteers for families at risk, literacy and substance abuse.

- 1. In-home support for families. The Retired Senior Volunteer Program provides regular friendly visits and vital transportation for frail elders. Foster Grandparents provide regular visits in home to families to help prevent child abuse and neglect. The Senior Companion Program provides regular visits to frail elders in cooperation with health agencies providing in-home care to prevent unnecessary institutionalization. Senior companions are an important part of care plans that cover health, nutrition, transportation and companionship.
- 2. Literacy. The inability to read and write is a major barrier to financial and intellectual advancement. The Retired Senior Volunteer Program and the Foster Grandparent Program working in community schools, literacy programs and adult education centers can help Maine residents become literate.

3. Substance abuse. Elder volunteers will be assigned to treatment, counseling and rehabilitation programs for alcoholics and drug abusers. This shall include working with preventive education programs and with correctional institutions.

The 9 Older American Volunteer Programs in Maine will complete annually a grant application to the Bureau of Maine's Elderly that explains how each program will expand the number of elders working in areas of literacy and in-home support for families. Each grant will be unique to each program, based on the needs of the community they serve.

The Retired Senior Volunteer Programs are for persons over 60 years of age. They have an opportunity to volunteer with different age groups at a wide variety of nonprofit organizations and agencies. In some instances, they are reimbursed for travel and meals.

The Foster Grandparent Programs are for low-income elders who wish to volunteer with children with special needs. They each receive a stipend of \$2,290 per year in addition to meal and travel reimbursements.

The Senior Companion Program is for low-income elders who wish to volunteer to assist home-bound elders. They receive a stipend of \$2,290 per year and will be reimbursed for travel.

All 3 volunteer programs provide placement, training, insurance and special volunteer recognition events.

Since the principal source of funds is the Federal Agency, ACTION, the fiscal management procedures for receipt and expenditure of funds are established in accordance with federal regulations. The project grantees or sponsors, funded by ACTION, are required to demonstrate their capability to safeguard public expenditures.
