	AN ACT to Create a Small Business Ombudsman.
	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

	CHAPTER 403

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1	SMALL BUSINESS OMBUDSMAN
2	§16001. Definitions
3 4 5	As used in this chapter, unless the context oth- erwise indicates, the following terms have the fol- lowing meanings.
6 7	1. Office. "Office" means the Office of the Small Business Ombudsman.
8 9	2. Ombudsman. "Ombudsman" means the Small Busi- ness Ombudsman.
10 11 12 13 14	3. Small business. "Small business" means any business or employee cooperative or corporation sub- ject to Title 13, chapter 85, subchapter III, employ- ing 20 persons or less or with sales of \$2,500,000 or less.
15	<u>§16002. Establishment</u>
16 17	There is created the Office of the Small Business Ombudsman.
18	<u>§16003. Ombudsman</u>
19 20 21 22 23 24	The Office of the Small Business Ombudsman shall be under the direction of the Small Business Ombudsman. The ombudsman shall be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the Legislature. The term of the ombudsman shall be coterminous with that of the Governor.
25	<u>§16004. Duties</u>
26	The ombudsman shall:
27 28 29 30 31	1. Advocacy. Serve as the principal advocate in the State on behalf of small businesses, including, but not limited to, advisory participation in the consideration of all legislation and proposed rules which affect small businesses;
32 k 33	2. Solicitation from private sector. Solicit input and suggestions from the private sector;

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<u>3. Representation before other state agencies.</u>
<u>Represent the views and interests of small businesses</u>
<u>before federal, state and local administrative and</u>
<u>regulatory agencies whose policies and activities may</u>
<u>affect small businesses;</u>

6 <u>4. Coordination. Work with other state agencies</u>
7 to promote coordination of activities of state agen 8 cies performing functions affecting the operation of
9 small businesses;

10 5. Information. Enlist the cooperation and as-11 sistance of public and private agencies, businesses 12 and other organizations in disseminating information 13 about the programs and services provided by State 14 Government which are of benefit to small businesses 15 and information on how small businesses can partici-16 pate in or make use of those programs and services;

17 <u>6. Referrals. Receive complaints of operators of</u> 18 <u>small businesses and refer them to the appropriate</u> 19 <u>federal, state or local agency authorized by law for</u> 20 <u>appropriate action on those complaints;</u>

21 7. Investigations; research. Conduct investiga-22 tions, research, studies and analyses of matters af-23 fecting the interests of small businesses;

24 8. Protection. Promote and encourage the protec 25 tion of legitimate interests of small businesses
26 within the State; and

27 <u>9. Annual report. Prepare and submit written an-</u>
28 <u>nual reports to the Governor and Legislature describ-</u>
29 <u>ing the activities and recommendations of the office.</u>

30 §16005. Employees; assistance of other agencies

31 <u>The ombudsman may hire such clerical staff as he</u> 32 <u>considers necessary to carry out this chapter.</u> For 33 <u>that purpose, the ombudsman may request from any</u> 34 <u>state agency such assistance, services and data as</u> 35 will enable him to carry out his duties.

36 §16006. Small Business Advisory Council

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1	The Small Business Advisory Council, as estab-
2	lished by section 12004, subsection 10, shall consist
3	of 15 members as follows: Two Senators to be ap-
4	pointed by the President of the Senate, one of whom
5	shall be a member of the majority political party and
6	one of whom shall be a member of the minority politi-
7	cal party; 2 representatives to be appointed by the
8	Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom
9	shall be a member of the majority political party and
10	one of whom shall be a member of the minority politi-
11	cal party; and 11 members to be appointed by the Gov-
12	ernor. The members appointed by the Governor shall
13	serve for 3-year terms, except that, for those first
14	appointed by the Governor, 4 shall serve for 3-year
15	terms, 4 shall serve for 2-year terms and 3 shall
16	serve for one-year terms. The Governor shall desig-
17	nate a chairman from among those 11 members appointed
18	by him. Any chairman shall serve as chairman for only
19	one year, except that the Governor may designate the
20	same member as chairman for one additional year.

21 The council shall meet not less than 4 times а 22 year and shall aid the ombudsman in formulating policies and discussing problems related to the adminis-23 tration of this chapter and in assuring impartiality 24 and freedom from political influence in the solution 25 26 of any problems. The advisory council may make recommendations to the Legislature for any changes in this chapter as in its opinion will aid in accomplishing 27 28 the objectives of this chapter. Each member of the 29 30 advisory council shall be compensated according to chapter 379. 31

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

2 The purpose of this bill is to establish the Of-3 fice of the Small Business Ombudsman which will pro-4 vide services to and act as an advocate for small 5 businesses within the State. The ombudsman will so-6 licit input from the private sector and serve as principal advocate for small businesses by represent-7 8 ing them before state agencies and coordinating ef-9 forts of state agencies affecting small businesses. The ombudsman may conduct investigations and studies 10 11 as he determines necessary and will make annual re-12 ports to the Legislature.

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
