5 6	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
7	34-B MRSA §1214 is enacted to read:
8 9	§1214. Committee for the Interdepartmental Coordination of Services to Children and Families
10	1. Establishment. The Committee for the Inter-
11	departmental Coordination of Services to Children and
12	Families is established.
13	2. Purpose. It is the intent of the Legislature
14	to encourage the coordination of policies and pro-
15	grams for Maine children and families.

1 3. Membership. The committee shall be composed of 4 members: The Commissioner of Corrections; Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services; Commissioner of Human Services; and Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

- 4. Goals of the committee. The goals of the committee shall be:
 - A. To encourage a statewide system of coordinated services, which are responsive to the current needs of children and families and which are delivered by a partnership of public, private and nonprofit state level and community based agencies, and to promote access to services by all children and their families who are in need of these services;
 - B. To evaluate on a continuing basis the allocation of resources to ensure the availability of quality services delivered in a coordinated and efficient manner that is consistent with the needs of children and families; and
 - C. To continue the development of a comprehensive and coordinated approach to initiation and revision of policy affecting services to children and families.
- 25 <u>5. Meetings. The committee shall meet on a reg-</u>
 26 ular basis.
- 27 <u>6. Chairman. The committee shall select a</u>
 28 <u>chairman from among the 4 commissioners and the</u>
 29 <u>chairman shall serve for a term established by the</u>
 30 <u>committee.</u>
 - 7. Subcommittees. The committee may appoint subcommittees to carry out its work. Subcommittee membership may include representatives of public and private agencies which serve youth and families and other persons with special knowledge of, responsibility for or interest in an area related to the goals of the committee.
 - 8. Report. The committee shall report annually to the Legislature on its progress in meeting the

- goals cited in subsection 4 and its proposals for implementing these same goals in the forthcoming year.
- 3 9. Administration. The costs associated with
 4 the committee shall be shared among the members of
 5 the committee. Nothing in this section may be con6 strued to prohibit a member department from assigning
 7 its employees to serve as staff to the committee.
 8 The Department of Mental Health and Mental Retarda9 tion shall serve as fiscal agent for the committee.
- 10 10. Authorization to accept funds. The Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation may accept, on behalf of the committee, funds from the Federal Government, from any political subdivision of the State or from any individual, foundation or corporation and may expend these funds for purposes which are consistent with this section.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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In closing days of the Second Regular Session of the 108th Legislature, the Department of Human Services, Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and Department of Educational and Cultural Services were requested to develop a coordinated policy on services to children and families. On January 27, 1978, the Commissioner of Human Services, Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and Department of Educational and Cultural Services presented to the Governor and the 108th Legislature a report entitled Coordinating Services for Children and Families. The report contained a series of recommendations, some of which required legislative The commissioners also agreed to establish an interdepartmental committee to coordinate services for children and families between the 3 departments. When the Department of Corrections was separated from the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Commissioner of Corrections was added to the membership of the committee. The committee has met since 1978 and has taken significant steps towards resolving long-standing problems of duplication and gaps in services. This bill mandates the Commissioner of Corrections, Commissioner of Human

4	to continue the efforts of coordination of children
5	and family services and review policies that have al-
5	ready begun and to report to the Legislature on an

8 The costs of the committee are currently shared 9 among the 4 participating departments. This bill 10 continues the arrangement and entails no additional 11 fiscal demands.

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
