11 12	Amend the bill by striking out all of the title and inserting in its place the following:
13 14	'RESOLVE, to Establish a Joint Select Committee on Long-term Care Staffing Issues.'
15 16 17	Further amend the bill by striking out everything after the title and inserting in its place the following:
18 19 20 21	'Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
22 23 24	Whereas, the Medicaid program has a fundamental obligation to meet the needs of eligible individuals in need of nursing home care; and
25 26 27	Whereas, nursing homes provide a community service by providing care to Medicaid eligible individuals; and
28 29 30	Whereas, the provision of additional beds by itself will not satisfy the needs of all individuals; and
31 32 33	Whereas, the Medicaid program has an obligation to provide reasonable payments to meet the needs of eligible individuals; and
34	Whereas, a determination of the appropriate mech-

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- anism to meet these needs will require further analysis and experimentation; and
- Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it
- 9 **Study authorized. Resolved:** That the Legislature is authorized to conduct an independent analysis and review of:
- 12 1. The current problem of nursing availability 13 to meet the needs for health care services in the 14 community, including home health, hospitals and nursing homes;
 - 2. The appropriate job classification level of direct care-giving personnel in Maine's nursing homes and home care agencies, defining the education and skill required for each classification level and the appropriate method of certification, including adequacy of management training for these personnel;
 - The appropriate method of determining classification levels of staff required to provide the level of care needed in today's nursing homes and home care agencies;
 - 4. The number of direct-care personnel required to adequately staff hospitals, nursing homes and home care agencies to meet the growing demands placed on Maine's long-term care system and the potential labor supply, by region, available in Maine;
- 5. The wage benefits and incentives required to attract and retain people from the available Maine labor pool appropriate to each job classification and region of the State;

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- 6. The ability of Maine's educational system to meet basic needs and to supply ongoing training and education which will allow vertical movement from one job classification to the next;
- 7. The appropriate reimbursement level, which ensures that Maine's hospitals, nursing homes and home care agencies are able to attract and retain sufficient levels of staff, including a review of the cost-sharing system proposed in Legislative Document 332 in the First Regular Session of the 113th Legislature; and
- 12 8. Strategies to resolve nursing and other 13 direct-care staff shortages in all areas of long-term 14 care; and be it further

Committee established. Resolved: That the Joint Select Committee on Long-term Care Staffing Issues is established. The committee shall be composed of 5 members, appointed in the following manner: Two members of the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources, one Senator appointed by the President of the Senate and one Representative appointed by the Speaker of the House; and one member each from the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and the Joint Standing Committee on Education, appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House; and be it further

Advisory board. Resolved: That the Governor shall appoint the Advisory Board on Long-term Care Staffing Issues to advise and assist the committee in its investigation, consisting of: one representative of the Department of Labor; one representative of the Department of Human Services; one representative of the Department of Educational and Cultural Services; one representative of the Maine Committee on Aging; one representative of the Maine Health Care Association; one representative of Health Care Provider, Inc.; one representative of the Home Care Alliance of

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Maine; one representative of the Maine Hospital Association; one representative of the Maine Association of Certified Nursing Assistants; one representative of the Long-term Care Nursing Council; one representative of the Commission on Nursing Supply and Accessibility; one professional research person employed by a Maine labor organization; and one professional labor economist; and be it further

Appointments. Resolved: That each person required to make an appointment or appointments under this resolve shall make the appointment or appointments within 30 days of the effective date of this resolve and shall notify the Chairman of the Legislative Council of their appointments; and be it further

Convening of committee; board. Resolved: When the appointment of all committee members and advisory board members is completed, the Chairman of Legislative Council shall convene the first meeting of the committee within 15 days. The committee shall choose a chairman from among its members. Within 30 days of the first meeting of the committee, the committee's chairman shall convene the first meeting of the advisory board and shall select a chairman from among the advisory board members; and be it further

Report. Resolved: That the committee shall present its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the First Regular Session of the 114th Legislature by January 15, 1989; and be it further

Assistance. Resolved: That, if staff assistance is desired, assistance shall be requested from the Legislative Council. The committee, in consultation with the Legislative Council, may retain professional consultants with expertise in this area to assist in the study; and be it further

Compensation. Resolved: That the members of the committee who are Legislators shall receive the leg-

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1 2 3 4 5 6 7	islative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for each day of attendance at committee meetings. All members of the committee, except state employees, shall receive reimbursement for expenses upon application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council; and be it further		
8 9 10	Appropriation. Resolved: That the following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this resolve.

23	FISCAL NOTE		
24 25 26 27 28 29	This amendment requires a General Fund appropriation of \$57,750 as shown above. This will provide funding for per diem and meeting expenses for all members of the committee that are not state employees. It also provides \$50,000 to fund a consultant study of the Medicaid program.		

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-	STATEMENT	OF	FACT

This amendment replaces the original bill and establishes a Joint Select Committee on Long-term Care Staffing Issues. It also establishes an advisory committee to provide advice to the joint select committee. The committee may hire outside consultants upon the approval of the Legislative Council.
