IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVEN

Resolve, to Permit Lucille A. Clavette, Personal Representative of the Estate of Richard J. Clavette, to Sue the State for Wrongful Death.

Lucille A. Clavette, personal representative of the Estate of Richard J. Clavette; authorized to sue the State. Resolved: That, notwithstanding any law to the contrary, Lucille A. Clavette, personal repre-sentative of the estate of Richard J. Clavette, is authorized to bring suit against the State and its employees for wrongful death.

Richard J. Clavette died on or about February 21, 1986, while he was a resident of the Pineland Center in Pownal, Maine. Mr. Clavette had wandered off the Pineland Center premises on the morning of Friday, February 21, 1986, and was not found until the after-16

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noon of Sunday, February 23, 1986. The State Medical
Examiner fixed the time of death as the evening of
February 21, 1986.

action is to brought in the Superior Court 8. This for Kennebec County, within one year from the passage 9 10 of this resolve, against the State for damages, if any, and the conduct of this action shall be accord-11 12 ing to the practice of actions or proceedings between 13 parties in the Superior Court. The liabilities of 14 the parties and elements of damage, if any, shall be the same as liabilities and elements of damage as be-15 16 tween individuals. The complaint issuing out of the 17 Superior Court under the authority of this resolve shall be served on the Secretary of State by attested 18 copy by the sheriff or his deputies in any county of 19 20 the State. The Attorney General is authorized and 21 designated to appear, answer and defend this action 22 but none of the provisions of or defenses specified in the Maine Tort Claims Act, Maine Revised Statutes, 23 24 Title 14, chapter 741, shall apply. The Attorney 25 General or his designee is further authorized to enter into a compromise settlement, if agreed to by the 26 27 parties, which shall be binding on the State.

Any judgment that may be recovered in this 28 civil 29 action shall be payable from the State Treasury on final process issued by the Superior Court or, if ap-30 31 plicable, the Supreme Judicial Court and costs may be taxed for Lucille A. Clavette, personal representa-tive of the estate of Richard J. Clavette, if she re-32 33 34 covers in the action. Her recovery shall not exceed 35 \$65,000, including costs. Hearing thereon shall be 36 before a Justice of the Superior Court with or with-37 out jury; the justice to be the regularly scheduled justice presiding in the Kennebec County Superior 38 39 Court when this matter is scheduled for trial.

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

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Richard J. Clavette died on or about February 21, 1986, while he was a resident of the Pineland Center in Pownal, Maine. Mr. Clavette had wandered off the Pineland Center premises on the morning of Friday, February 21, 1986, and was not found until the afternoon of Sunday, February 23, 1986. The State Medical Examiner fixed the time of death as the evening of February 21, 1986.

Lucille A. Clavette is Richard J. Clavette's mother and the personal representative of his estate. She alleges that the negligence of the State and its employees was the proximate cause of her son's death. An inquiry panel, appointed by Kevin W. Concannon, Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, found that, throughout the search for Mr. Clavette, major system failures and serious errors in judgment did occur. The inquiry panel further found that there were substantive problems regarding administrative leadership and continuity of command, that communications broke down severely on several levels during the search and that the Pineland Center's own missing or lost resident search policy was not fol-The inquiry panel specifically found that if lowed. the search policy had been followed, the search effort would have been conducted in a more realistic manner and Mr. Clavette might have been found before he died. In addition, the panel concluded that the Clavette family was not well served during the obviously stressful time while Mr. Clavette was missing and recommended that one state employee be dismissed, that another be demoted, that another's salary be reduced, that another be suspended for a period and that 3 others receive written reprimands.

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
