§3951. Funds

- Brothers-Big Sisters of Maine programs or other similar certified programs for the following purposes:
- A. Identification of children, 7 to 18 years of age, eligible for services, through assessment and evaluation, consultation with families and group activities;
- B. Volunteer recruitment, screening, assessment, training and referral;
- 9 C. Direct services to eligible children, matched volunteers and client families; including, but not limited to, case support, guidance and counseling, crisis intervention, monitoring, training and group activities; and
- D. Follow-up services to clients and their families, including reevaluations, referrals and group activities.
- 2. Distribution of funds. As far as practicable, the department shall make funds available to all areas of the State. Funds shall be awarded to support existing Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Maine programs, and other similar certified programs, and new programs expanding into or locating in areas not currently served.
- 3. Local match. Any Big Brothers-Big Sisters of
 Maine program, or other similar nationally certified
 program, that applies for funds under this chapter
 shall demonstrate a match of either private donations, local funding or in-kind resources in accordance with policies of the Department of Human Services.

31 §3952. Rules

The Commissioner of Human Services is authorized and directed to adopt rules to implement this chapter to reflect widely accepted and current services which are presently provided. The commissioner shall consult with other child-serving state agencies, Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Maine and other appropriate parties. Allocations shall be based on the allocation scheme recommendations developed in consultation

	24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31	Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Maine target services to children in families, including low-income single parent families, which experience indicates are likely to need intervention services, since preventative measures provided by their program often do not fulfill the need. The primary prevention strategy used by Big Brothers-Big Sisters agencies is a one-to-one matching of adult volunteers to client children.
Ì	32 33 34 35	Big Brothers-Big Sisters' national affiliation ensures that the programs they implement are effective and meet strict standards for provision of such services.

Funds are intended to meet identified needs of children, especially in areas not yet served by existing Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Maine programs.

A state commitment to intervention is intended to result in decreased need for intervention services.
