# IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVEN

AN ACT to Establish a Moratorium on New Mussel Aquaculture Leases.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, a law was enacted to provide for and regulate research and aquaculture leases; and

Whereas, aquaculture offers substantial potential for the economic growth and productivity associated with the State's marine resources; and

Whereas, the Joint Standing Committee on Marine Resources has conducted a study on the blue mussel resource and harvesting in the State; and 1 Whereas, serious concern exists as to the adequa-2 cy of the present law governing aquaculture leasing 3 to protect valuable habitat and present fishing ac-4 tivity and to assure a sense of fairness and equity 5 in the leasing process; and

Whereas, there is substantial concern that the future of aquaculture in the State and the legitimacy of the entire concept of aquaculture leasing is threatened by these inadequacies; and

Whereas, review and revision of present law is essential before any further mussel aquaculture leasing occurs; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

19 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 20 follows:

21 Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §6072, sub-§7, as amended by PL 1983, c. 301, §3, is further amended to read:

 $\underline{\underline{\text{Decision.}}}$  The commissioner may grant the if he is satisfied that the proposed project will not unreasonably interfere with the ingress and egress of riparian owners, navigation, fishing or other uses of the area and is not in conflict with applicable coastal zoning statutes or ordinances. The commissioner may establish conditions that govern the leased area and the limitations on the use of the aquaculture activities. These conditions shall encourage the greatest multiple, compatible uses of the area, but shall also preserve the exclusive leased rights of the lessee to the extent necessary to carry out the lease purpose. For one year after the effective date of this subsection, the commissioner shall not act upon any application for a new aquaculture lease for the culture of mussels.

1 2 3	Sec. 2. Application. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 1, section 302, the provisions of Title 12, section 6072, subsection 7, apply
4 5 6 7 8	to any pending application for an aquaculture lease for culture of blue mussels under Title 12, section 6072. Title 12, section 6072, subsection 7 does not apply to any application to renew a lease previously issued under Title 12, section 6072.
9 10 11	Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.
12	STATEMENT OF FACT
13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22	This bill addresses one of the recommendations of a study done by the Joint Standing Committee on Marine Resources on the blue mussel resource and harvesting in the State. It institutes a moratorium on aquaculture leases for blue mussels and is in effect for one year from the effective date of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 6072, subsection 7. This moratorium covers pending leases if the applications have not been approved or denied by the commissioner.
