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STATEMENT OF FACT

It is estimated that 25,000 of the approximate 30,000 individuals admitted to our county jails in 1985 were under the influence of alcohol, including operating under the influence, or illegal drugs at the time of the commission of the crime. In 1986, the Department of Human Services provided funds to 3 of the county jails to establish substance abuse treatment services for the inmates and their families.

A survey of the remaining 11 county jails showed that only 5 jails have professional substance services and only one has presentence post-incarceration services. This bill provides the funds that allow for the initial steps in the development of inmate and family substance abuse services in the 11 county jails. The proposed funding based upon total inmate population an estimation of need by the county jail and state staff.
