9 10	§341. Establishment of Maine Agricultural Internship and Training Program
11 12	The commissioner shall establish a Maine Agricultural Internship and Training Program.

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§342. Responsibilities of the commissioner

The commissioner shall:

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- 1. Information. Conduct studies and otherwise gather, maintain and disseminate information concerning farmland transfers, availability of farm labor, existence of farm internship and training programs, persons desiring to participate in that training, farmers retiring or otherwise ceasing farming operations, persons desiring to enter farming or associated employment and all other information deemed necessary to carry out this chapter;
- 2. Training. Provide and supervise opportunities for on-farm and off-farm training, through state-sponsored programs or in cooperation with other appropriate agencies and organizations. Training may include on-site experience under the guidance of approved farmer-supervisors or classroom instruction in farm management, finance, equipment use and maintenance, production and marketing principles and techniques and other relevant subjects;
- 21 3. Assistance. Provide assistance in matching 22 retiring farmers with persons desiring to enter farm-23 ing and recruit and place interns with farmer - su-24 pervisors; and
 - 4. Cooperation. Cooperate with appropriate local, state and federal agencies and institutions and with farm organizations and interested individuals, including the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, the Department of Labor, the University of Maine and the Cooperative Extension Service, in carrying out this chapter.

32 STATEMENT OF FACT

Many farms owned by Maine farmers nearing retirement must be transferred to a new generation of trained and experienced farmers in order to preserve farming and farmland in the State. Whereas, at one time, a high proportion of agricultural students in our post-secondary schools had previous "hands-on" farm experience, today a very low percentage of these

2 1 3 1 4 1	rollment. The lack of formal farm training constitutes a barrier both for young people wishing to enter farming and older farmers desiring to transfer their farms to another generation.
	This bill provides that the commissioner shall establish a Maine Agricultural Apprenticeship and Training Program to address these needs.
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
