RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment

6 7 8 9	Constitutional amendment. RESOLVED: Two thirds of each branch of the Legislature concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Maine be proposed:		
10	Constitution, Article I, §16 is amended to read:		

Section 16. To keep and bear arms. Every citizen has a right to keep and bear arms for the common defence; and this right shall never be questioned.

Constitutional referendum procedure; form question; effective date. Resolved: That the city

aldermen, town selectmen and plantation assessors of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, at a statewide election, on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following the passage of this resolution, to vote upon the ratification of the amendment proposed in this resolution by voting upon the following question:

 "Shall the Constitution of Maine be amended to clarify the rights of citizens to keep and bear arms?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question, and shall designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within the corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots shall be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if it appears that a majority of the legal votes are in favor of the amendment, the shall proclaim that fact without delay and the amendment shall become part of the Constitution on the date of the proclamation.

Secretary of State shall prepare ballots. Resolved: That the Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this resolution necessary to carry out the purposes of this referendum.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

The Constitution of Maine, Article I, Section 16 currently reads, "Every citizen has a right to keep and bear arms for the common defense; and this right shall never be questioned."

An April 1986 Supreme Court decision interpreted "common defense" as "pointing to service in a broadly based, organized militia" and, citing another state case, "common defense" does not include hunting."
