14 15	This bill appropriates funds from the Department of Human Services.
16 17	1. The funds to be managed by the Bureau of Health will be expended as follows.

Training for Professionals - \$100,000 in 1987-88 and \$200,000 in 1988-89 to be used for community based services to provide adequate training, through increased training programs of all professionals who work directly with teenagers and their families in the area of adolescent development, sexuality, pregnancy and teen parenting. This includes paraprofessionals and volunteers.

Health Care - \$400,000 in 27 B. Reproductive 1987-88 and \$800,000 in 1988-89 to be used for 28 reproductive health service providers to offer specialized services for teenagers, including 29 30 31 weekend and evening service hours, locations of 32 services accessible to teens and counseling for 33 teens regarding sexual behavior and decision mak-34 ing.

Teacher Education - \$40,000 in 1987-88 and \$80,000 in 1988-89 to be used to assure education for teachers to conduct properly a comprehensive health education curriculum which includes family life and sexuality education. The funds are to be managed in cooperation with the Department of Educational and Cultural Services.
8 9	2. The funds to be managed by the Bureau of Social Services will be expended as follows.

Counseling Services - \$100,000 in 1987-88 and \$200,000 in 1988-89 to be used to develop 2 programs to demonstrate counseling services for pregnant teens, as well as parenting teens. Counseling services may include: Nondirective comprehensive pregnancy options counseling, peer support; career; adoption counseling; premarital relationship counseling or marriage counseling and treatment for sexual abuse, substance abuse and issues of self esteem.

Teen Parent Programs - \$500,000 in 1987-88 and \$1,000,000 in 1988-89 to be used for services in the community for pregnant and parenting teens and their children which may include drop-in centers, parenting classes, child care and self-advocacy training, child birth classes, support groups, therapeutic groups and teaching and tutorial services, employment and training and housing programs.
