STATEMENT OF FACT

In fiscal year 1981, York County experienced a loss of \$600,000 in public funding with the conversion of categorical mental health center funding to a block grant administered by the State. No other area of the State experienced a similar reduction in public funding. The program most adversely affected was outpatient counseling services for adults and children.

In fiscal year 1980, the outpatient staff for children and adults numbered 17 (11 - 6). In fiscal year 1986, the outpatient staff numbered 11 (7 - 4), a reduction of over 30%, even though the population during the 6-year period increased by 20%, over 27,000 residents, 139,566 to 166,800.

The 1986 Bureau of Mental Health plan documented that while the average of Bureau of Mental Health funded outpatient services for the State is for 139 persons per 10,000 population, in York County the level of state funding is for only 90 per 10,000 population.

The current waiting lists for outpatient services, especially for children, is creating major hardships for families under severe emotional stress. The projected population increases will only intensify that stress and create major costs in other areas, such as welfare, school dropouts, divorce and the criminal justice system.

The appropriation in this bill will be a major first step in providing to York County residents the same level of outpatient mental health services provided to the rest of the State.
