STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVEN

Resolve, to Establish the Commission on Children in Need of Supervision and Treatment.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, there are substantial numbers of adolescents and young adults who need mental health and substance abuse treatment in order to become productive citizens but who refuse to seek or accept that treatment; and

Whereas, many of these young people become homeless individuals who add substantially to the law en-

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1 forcement problems of Maine's communities as well as 2 their social welfare caseloads; and

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3 Whereas, many of these young people cause substantial disruption to their families, by appearing 4 5 at home sporadically, causing family disputes, physically damaging the premises or occupants on occasion, refusing to obey any rules of behavior and adversely 6 7 8 influencing younger siblings, all to the great dis-9 tress of their parents who are unable to take control 10 of the situation; and

11 Whereas, there have been discussions about re-12 storing status offenses to the juvenile code, easing 13 the standard for commitment of juveniles under the 14 mental health laws, or building a behavior stabiliza-15 tion unit for initial treatment of this segment of 16 the population, the State has taken no action to meet 17 the needs of these young people; and

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18 Whereas, continued inaction causes the state 19 great expense in higher crime rates, lost wages and 20 taxes and increased social service and rehabilitation 21 services; and

22 Whereas, the State is currently paying very large 23 sums of money for specialized secure treatment place-24 ments in facilities out-of-state and despite ex-25 pressed concern about these costs, the inaction con-26 tinues; and

27 Whereas, intervention with out-of-control young 28 people at an earlier age would prevent the necessity 29 of sending them to expensive out-of-state facilities 30 later; and

31 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, 32 these facts create an emergency within the meaning of 33 the Constitution of Maine and require the following 34 legislation as inmediately necessary for the preser-35 vation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 36 therefore, be it

Commission established; membership. Resolved:
That there is established a special commission on
children in need of supervision and treatment. The
commission shall consist of 15 members. The follow-

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ing members shall be appointed by the Legislative 1 2 Council: . . 3 1. Two representatives from the Joint Standing 4 Committee on Appropriations; 5 2. Two representatives from the Joint Standing 6 Committee on Human Resources; 7 3. Two representatives from the Joint Standing 8 Committee on Audit and Program Review; and 9. 4. Two representatives from the Joint Standing 10 Committee on Judiciary. 11 The Commissioner of Corrections, or his designee; 12 the Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, or his designee; the Commissioner of Human Services, or his designee; the Commissioner of Educa-13 14 tional and Cultural Services, or his designee; the 15 16 chairman of the Juvenile Justice Advisory Group, or 17 his designee; the Executive Director of Advocates for the Developmentally Disabled, or his designee; and a 18 19 representative from the State's resident and treat-20 ment centers, appointed by the Governor shall also be 21 members; and be it further 22 Tasks. Resolved: That the commission shall: 23 1. Determine population of disturbed juveniles; 24 Analyze funding for existing out-of-state 2. 25 placements that could be served in new programs; 26 Identify and recommend changes in the laws to З. enable the State to commit individuals, who need 27 28 treatment, to a secure treatment facility; Identify and recommend needed changes in the 29 4. · 30 Medicaid plan to fund such a facility; 31 5. Identify existing state resources that could 32 be used for the purposes, such as funds, buildings, 33 staff: 34 6. Recommend necessary State money appropria-35 tion:

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1 7. Determine the nature of treatment to be pro-2 vided in a secure treatment facility for this popula-3 tion;

8. Identify how this facility will integrate with existing treatment resources in the State, and suggest any changes to facilitate smooth transitions from this facility to other resources as appropriate; and

9 9. Prepare an overall plan and approach, includ-10 ing supporting legislation, necessary to have the 11 State meet its obligation to these out-of-control ju-12 veniles and young adults, their families and their 13 communities; and be it further

Assistance. Resolved: That the Office of Policy
 and Legal Analysis shall provide any necessary as sistance; and be it further

17 Compensation. Resolved: That Legislators shall 18 receive the legislative per diem and all nonstate em-19 ployees who are members shall receive compensation 20 for expenses only; and be it further

Findings; report. Resolved: That the commission shall present its findings, plan and prepare legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 113th Legislature by March 1, 1988.

STATEMENT OF FACT

26 There are many juveniles who are out-of-control 27 and living at home and raising havoc with their fami-28 lies, or have left home and are on their own and need 29 treatment services. This bill creates a commission 30 to study this group of young people, examine 31 society's responsibilities towards this group and 32 make recommendations as appropriate.

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
