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As used in this Part, unless the context indicates otherwise, the following terms have the following meanings. 1. Office. "Office" means the Office of the Business Advocate. 2. Small business. "Small business" means a business employing 20 persons or less with gross sales not exceeding \$2,500,000 per year. \$6052. Office of the Business Advocate established The Office of the Business Advocate is established to represent and serve as an advocate for small businesses. The office shall inform the Governor and the Legislature with respect to the issues and concerns of small businesses. \$6053. Duties and responsibilities of the office The office shall be responsible for implementing its policies and the programs of the department. The office shall: 1. Assist businesses working with state agencies. Assist small businesses, upon request, when they are dealing with state agencies to facilitate communication and the conduct of business between state agencies and businesses; 2. STATEMENT OF FACT

Most Maine businesses are small. Approximately 80% of Maine businesses employ less than 10 people. As a result, these types of businesses often do not have the resources or the expertise to represent themselves and serve as advocates with respect to issues in State Government that affect small businesses. In addition, many small businesses lack the resources and expertise in dealing with state agencies.

Since the expansion of the Maine economy will de-pend, to a significant extent, upon the expansion and successful operation of small businesses, it is nec-essary to be aware of the needs, problems and oppor-tunities facing small businesses. This bill lishes the Office of the Business Advocate within the Executive Department to assist and represent busi-nesses in the State. The Business Advocate will sist businesses in their dealings with state agen-cies, including applications for licenses and per-mits. The Business Advocate is required to work with the private sector and develop a communications net-work with the private sector.

This bill proposes that the Business Advocate be a successful business person with at least 10 years of current experience in business. In addition, the business person must demonstrate an understanding of the regulatory process.

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
