4 5	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
6 7	28 MRSA $\$801$, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 252, $\$7$, is amended to read:
8	§801. Licenses generally
9 10	Licenses for the sale of spirituous, vinous and malt liquor to be consumed on the premises where sold
11 12	may be issued to qualified applicants for qualified premises, as defined in section 2, upon payment of
13 14 15	the fees provided, subject to the provision that the initial application for the license is approved by the municipal officers of the town or city in which

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the intended qualified premises is located. If the qualified premises is located in an unorganized place, the application shall be approved by the county commission of the county within which the unorganized place is located. All approvals shall be accomplished pursuant to section 252-A.

No licensee for the sale of liquor to be consumed on the premises where sold may by himself, clerk, servant or agent, sell, give, furnish or deliver any liquor to be consumed elsewhere than upon the licensed premises, except that, subject to law and the rules of the commission, hotel licensees may sell liquor in the original packages to bona fide registered room guests, except that persons who are qualified caterers and hold a valid permit under this section may at the conclusion of a catered event distribute open bottles of wine to the person contracting the catering services.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to provide an exception to the on-premises licensing law to permit the person contracting a catered event to possess all unused portions of wine purchased under the contract.

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
