AN ACT to Repeal the Mandatory Brucellosis Vaccination for Cattle. 3

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Current law requires that all female cattle born after January 1, 1982, must be vaccinated against brucellosis. Cattle which at no time will be sold, cattle which will be sold only for the purpose of immediate slaughter and cattle which are to be shipped out of state are exempt from this law. Cattle im-ported into the State must be vaccinated against brucellosis, except in the case of calves under 120 days of age and except in the case of cattle brought in for immediate slaughter. Many states and provinces that are free of this disease discourage or allow vaccination against brucellosis since vaccination makes detection of the disease difficult therefore increases the potential for spread of the disease. Consequently, cattle from these areas cannot be imported into the State as dairy or beef replacements. In addition, unvaccinated cattle within the State cannot be sold as replacements. This bill eliminates the mandatory vaccination requirement, thereby allowing unvaccinated cattle to be bought and sold as replacements.

Voluntary vaccination would not jeopardize the health of the cattle in the State. This State is free of brucellosis and all cattle imported into the State must be tested negative for brucellosis within 30 days prior to importation and must be retested 45 to 120 days after entering the State. Therefore cattle imported into or born in the State do not pose the threat of a spread of brucellosis.

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
