STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVEN

AN ACT to Facilitate the Advertising of Local Businesses under the Maine Traveler Information Services Act.

5 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 6 follows:

23 MRSA §1914, sub-§10, as repealed and replaced by PL 1981, c. 318, §4, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

10. Approach signs. Approach signs for any business or facility are subject to this subsection.

STATEMENT OF FACT

18 Under current law, businesses or facilities operating at a distance from the nearest public way are 19 20 permitted to erect signs advising the traveling pub-21 lic of the existence of the business or facility if 22 they are more than 1,000 feet from the public way or 23 not visible therefrom. These signs may not be 24 erected if the road connecting the business with the 25 public way is publicly owned. The law creates an un-26 fair discrimination between businesses which are not visible from a public road, but which happen to be on 27 28 private roads from those which are on public roads.

This bill eliminates this discrimination by creating a limited exception to the law, allowing a business on a public road to erect an approach sign if it is at the end of the road, the road is municipally owned and the business is both within 1,000 feet from a public way and is not visible from it.

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
