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STATEMENT OF FACT

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Among the population of Maine, there currently exists extraordinarily low post-secondary educational aspirations. Ninety-two percent of the State's population does not possess a college degree. In part this is explained by the fact that over 26% of the population lives below 150% of the federal poverty In addition, the majority of rural high threshold. schools cannot offer a full precollege curriculum and consequently, a large majority of disadvantaged Maine high school youth are not equipped with the academic tools to successfully compete in college, university and vocational-technical institute freshman level In particular, educationally, culturally courses. financially disadvantaged students are signifiand cantly handicapped in their efforts to attain their educational goals. For example, first generation college students from Maine are handicapped by the lack of college or university experience on the part of their parents; physically handicapped students have additional physical difficulties attaining their educational goals. As a result, students who higher are educationally, culturally and financially disadvantaged need additional support and encouragement to and graduate education. professional attain Nontraditional students as well need additional support to gain access and to attain their educational qoals.

As the employment base in Maine is changing to a more service and technical orientation, there is need for additional educational opportunities for many disadvantaged Maine residents. Upward Bound, Talent Search and Student Support Services provide support services that enhance the prospects of educational excellence for marginally prepared Maine students. These programs have assisted many Maine residents in gaining access to the State's colleges and universities. In these programs, there exists a proven model for assisting Maine's colleges, universities and vocational-technical institutes. Since federal support

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1 for these programs in Maine has declined or remained 2 at constant levels since 1980, fewer students have 3 been served each year by these programs. This bill 4 seeks to remedy this situation by creating project 5 REACH.

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
