1 AN ACT to Establish the Indian Point Wildlife
2 Sanctuary in Georgetown.
3

4 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as
5 follows:

6 12 MRSa §7651, sub-§1, as amended by PL 1985, c.
7 88, is further amended to read:

8 1. Designation of wildlife sanctuaries. The fol-
9 lowing described territories are designated as wild-
10 life sanctuaries and are subject to the commission-
11 er's authority under section 7653:

12 Back Bay Sanctuary, Portland: Back Bay, so called, in
13 Portland, in the County of Cumberland, above the
14 Grand Trunk Railway bridge or within the area en-
15 closed by a boundary line drawn as follows: Beginning

1 at Fish Point at the easterly end of the Eastern
2 Promenade in the City of Portland, thence extending
3 about northeasterly to Pomeroy's Rock, thence about
4 northeasterly to Mackworth or Half-way Rock southerly
5 of Mackworth or Mackey Island, thence in a northerly
6 direction to a point marked by a buoy 1,000 feet from
7 the most easterly point of Mackworth Island, so
8 called, thence in a northwesterly direction 700 yards
9 more or less to the northernmost point of the large
10 ridge on the north side of Mackworth Island, thence
11 in a north northwesterly direction in a straight line
12 about parallel to the Town of Falmouth shore to the
13 point on the shoreline where the property known as
14 the Berry Estate meets the property known as the
15 Portland Country Club, thence northwesterly and
16 southwesterly along the shore line of the Town of
17 Falmouth including that of the salt water pond adja-
18 cent to the property known as the Portland Country
19 Club to Mackworth or Mackey Point, thence about
20 southwesterly along the easterly side of Martin Point
21 bridge to the shore of East Deering (United States
22 Marine Hospital) Portland, thence about southwesterly
23 and southerly along said East Deering shore to the
24 Grand Trunk bridge, thence along the easterly side of
25 said Grand Trunk bridge to the shore of the Eastern
26 Promenade, Portland, thence about southerly along
27 said shore of the Eastern Promenade to the said Fish
28 Point, the point of beginning.

29 Baxter State Park: The following described tracts of
30 territory situated in the Counties of Penobscot and
31 Piscataquis W. E. L. S. the same being in unorganized
32 townships, to wit: That portion of Township 6, Range
33 8, Penobscot County in the southwest corner of said
34 township bounded and described as follows: Beginning
35 at the southwest corner of said township thence north
36 along the west line of said township to First Grand
37 or Matagamon Lake; thence easterly, southeasterly and
38 southerly along the western shore of said lake to the
39 point where the said western shore intersects the
40 north line of the Dam Lot, so called, which was con-
41 veyed to the East Branch Dam Company by deed dated
42 October 28, 1902 and recorded in Penobscot County
43 Registry of Deeds in book 727, page 335 and reputed
44 to be now owned by the East Branch Improvement Compa-
45 ny; thence running west along the north line of said
46 Dam Lot to the northwest corner thereof; thence run-

1 ning south along the west line of said Dam Lot to the
2 southwest corner thereof; thence running east along
3 the south line of said Dam Lot to the East Branch of
4 the Penobscot River; thence running south by said
5 East Branch to a point in the south line of said
6 township where the said East Branch intersects the
7 same; thence running west along the said south line
8 of said township to the southwest corner thereof and
9 the point of beginning; all of Township 3, Range 9,
10 Piscataquis County now the property of the State of
11 Maine: All of Township 4, Range 9, Piscataquis County:
12 All of Township 5, Range 9, Piscataquis County:
13 That portion of Township 6, Range 9, Piscataquis
14 County lying south of Trout Brook and south of
15 Wadleigh Brook and extending from the east line of
16 said township across said township to the west line
17 thereof: All of Township 3, Range 10, Piscataquis
18 County: All of Township 4, Range 10, Piscataquis
19 County: All of Township 5, Range 10, Piscataquis
20 County, excepting therefrom an area of 20 acres in
21 the southwesterly quarter thereof, formerly owned by
22 and belonging to Charles A. Daisey, now owned by
23 Arnold R. Daisey, which was excepted and reserved
24 from a deed from Percival Proctor Baxter to the State
25 of Maine, as set forth in chapter 91 of the private
26 and special laws of 1943. The said within described 8
27 tracts or parcels of land contain 149,506 acres, more
28 or less.

29 Beauchamp Sanctuary: The following described territory
30 situated in Rockport and Camden, in the County of
31 Knox: Beginning at the mouth of Goose River in
32 Rockport; thence in a northerly direction along number
33 1 highway to the mouth of the Megunticook River
34 in Camden; thence in a southerly direction along the
35 coast around Metcalf Point and Beauchamp Point and
36 thence in a northerly direction to the said Goose
37 River.

38 Carver's Pond Waterfowl Sanctuary: The waters of
39 Carver's Pond, so called, in the Town of Vinalhaven,
40 County of Knox or 100 feet from the mean high water
41 mark of said pond. Carver's Pond for the purpose of
42 this sanctuary shall be considered all the waters of
43 said pond above the bridge on Main Street of the Town
44 of Vinalhaven.

1 Drake's Island Game Sanctuary: All that part of
2 Drake's Island, so called, in the Town of Wells,
3 which is bounded as follows: Northerly by the game
4 sanctuary established by chapter 31 of the public
5 laws of 1927; easterly by the Atlantic Ocean; south-
6 erly by the Wells River; and westerly by said river
7 and creek flowing under Dyke's Bridge, so called.

8 Dry Pond Sanctuary: On Dry Pond or from the shores of
9 said pond, which pond is situated in the Town of
10 Gray, in the County of Cumberland.

11 Fairfield Sanctuary: The following described territory
12 situated in the Town of Fairfield, in the County
13 of Somerset: Good Will Farm, so called; the Girls'
14 Farm, so called, of Good Will Farm; land of G. W.
15 Hinckley; land of John Connor; land of J. Russell
16 Barrett, which land is bounded as follows: On the
17 north by land of Edwin Hicks and N. E. Bessey; on the
18 east by the Kennebec River; on the south by land of
19 Fred Tobey, Frank Moore, H. B. Hamm and C. B. Tuttle,
20 also by the Fairfield town farm; on the west by land
21 of L. P. Gifford, Alonzo Hoxie, Edwin Marcou and also
22 by Martin Stream; said territory being Good Will Farm
23 proper, so called, the Girls' Farm, so called, and
24 land of G. W. Hinckley, John Connor and J. Russell
25 Barrett, adjacent to the above-named farms. For pro-
26 visions relating specifically to Fairfield Sanctuary,
27 see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph A, subpara-
28 graph (4).

29 Glencove Sanctuary; Rockport: Glencove, so called, in
30 Penobscot Bay, which cove is situated in the Town of
31 Rockport, in the County of Knox, and which cove is
32 bounded as follows, to wit: On the north, west and
33 south by the main land, on the east by a line extend-
34 ing from Smith's Point to Ram Island and from Ram Is-
35 land to the easterly point of Pine Hill in said
36 Rockport.

37 Gray Game Sanctuary: The following described territory
38 situated in the Town of Gray in the County of Cum-
39 berland: Beginning at Gray Corner following the
40 Poland Spring Road to Dry Mills, thence following the
41 North Raymond Road to the guidepost at intersection
42 of East Raymond Road, thence following the East Ray-
43 mond Road to Douglass Mill Road; thence following the

1 Douglass Mill and Furbush Road to "Sand Brook," so
2 called, on shore of Little Sebago Lake, thence fol-
3 lowing shore of Little Sebago Lake to Foster Shore,
4 so called, at intersection of Foster and Ramsdell
5 Road, so called, near camp of Dr. Cushing following
6 last named road in easterly direction to intersection
7 of Ramsdell Road near homestead of Edgar Foster,
8 thence in a southerly direction following said
9 Ramsdell road to intersection of road leading from
10 Gray to West Gray, thence following last named road
11 to Gray Corner to point of beginning.

12 Hog Island Game Sanctuary: Hog Island in the Town of
13 Bremen, Lincoln County.

14 Indian Point Game Preserve; Sagadahoc County: Begin-
15 ning at the easterly end of the north boundary of
16 land owned by the Indian Point Association at a point
17 in the center of the Little River Channel where Reid
18 State Park begins; thence southerly and westerly by
19 the center of the Little River Channel, then by the
20 mean low water line southerly to the Promontory and
21 around westerly, including the islands known as Fox
22 and Loan Tree (reg. 73-211, 269, 212), and northerly
23 to the westerly end of the north boundary of land
24 owned by the Indian Point Association; thence in a
25 straight line along said north boundary by a ne-
26 glected fence bordering land of White to the point of
27 beginning. This is intended to enclose some 300
28 acres, more or less, and include all of the marshes,
29 beaches, dry lands and roads. All dry areas are de-
30 tailed in plans of 1973, consisting of 4 parts regis-
31 tered with the Sagadahoc County Registry of Deeds in
32 volume 9, pages 47A, 48, 48A and 49.

33 Jefferson and Whitefield Sanctuary: The following de-
34 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Jefferson
35 and Whitefield, in the County of Lincoln, which land
36 is bounded as follows: On the north by the highway
37 leading from Weary Pond to South Jefferson; on the
38 east by Sterns Brook and by Little Dyer's Pond and
39 the inlet stream and marsh of said pond and by the
40 highway leading from South Jefferson to Alna; on the
41 south by the Alna town line; on the west by the road
42 leading from Alna to said Weary Pond, in the Town of
43 Whitefield.

1 Kineo Point Sanctuary: Kineo Point, in Kineo, in the
2 County of Piscataquis.

3 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary: The fol-
4 lowing described territory situated in the Towns of
5 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro, in York County; be-
6 ginning at a point where the Little Ossipee River
7 joins the Saco River in the Town of Limington, thence
8 westerly and southerly along said Little Ossipee River
9 to the highway at Edgecomb's bridge, so called, in
10 Waterboro, thence southerly and easterly along said
11 highway to North Hollis, in the Town of Hollis,
12 thence easterly and northerly along the road next
13 west of Killick Brook to the road leading from Nason
14 Mills to Bonney Eagle, thence northeasterly along
15 said Bonney Eagle Road to the town line between
16 Limington and Hollis, thence northerly along said
17 town line to the Saco River, thence northerly along
18 said Saco River to the point of beginning. All roads
19 which serve to bound said Limington, Hollis and
20 Waterboro game sanctuary shall be a part of said
21 sanctuary. For provisions relating specifically to
22 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary, see sec-
23 tion 7654, subsection 5.

24 Megunticook Lake and Vicinity Sanctuary: The waters
25 of Megunticook Lake, formerly called Canaan Lake, and
26 its tributary lakes, ponds and streams, and upon the
27 land bordering on the same included within the fol-
28 lowing roads: Beginning at Hopkins' Corner, so
29 called, in the Town of Camden; thence via the Turn-
30 pike Road, so called, to Lincolnville Center; thence
31 to Wiley's Corner in Lincolnville, thence to the
32 Mansfield schoolhouse in the Town of Camden; thence
33 via the Fish Hatchery to place of beginning; all of
34 said lake, its tributaries and shores being located
35 in the Towns of Camden, Lincolnville and Hope, in the
36 Counties of Knox and Waldo. For provisions relating
37 specifically to Megunticook Lake and Vicinity
38 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
39 C, subparagraphs (1) and (2).

40 Merrymeeting Bay Game Sanctuary: Merrymeeting Bay in
41 the Towns of Bowdoinham and Woolwich bounded as fol-
42 lows: Commencing at the high tension tower on
43 Kelley's Point, so called, in Bowdoinham; thence
44 westerly by a line approximately 100 feet above the

1 high water mark designated by a series of posted
2 signs over the field lands and by posted signs and a
3 single strand of wire through the wooded area thus
4 southerly 100 feet more or less to a red stake at the
5 high water mark of Merrymeeting Bay; thence southerly
6 approximately 400 yards to a red stake or marker on
7 range between the first mentioned red stake and
8 Butler's Head, so called, this stake or marker shall
9 also be on range between the iron pin on the south-
10 easterly corner of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife
11 camp lot on the west shore of the Abagadasset River
12 and the eastern support tower on the southern high
13 tension power line in Woolwich; thence southeasterly
14 across the flats and waters of Merrymeeting Bay ap-
15 proximately 1,900 yards to a red stake or marker lo-
16 cated near high water mark on Elliott's Point, so
17 called, on the Woolwich shore; thence northeasterly
18 following high water mark approximately 1,250 yards
19 to a red stake or marker under the overhead high ten-
20 sion power cables; thence westerly by a straight line
21 to the point of beginning.

22 For provisions relating specifically to Merrymeeting
23 Bay Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 4.

24 Monroe Island Game Sanctuary: Monroe Island, in the
25 Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

26 Moosehead Lake Game Sanctuary: The following de-
27 scribed tracts or territory situated in the County of
28 Piscataquis: Moose Island and Farm Island, in
29 Moosehead Lake, and the territory bounded as follows:
30 Beginning on the shore of Moosehead Lake at a point
31 nearest to the easterly end of the state road leading
32 westerly from Greenville Junction, so called, to the
33 state fish hatchery on Squaw Brook, thence westerly
34 by said state road to said hatchery, thence north-
35 easterly down said brook to the shore of Moosehead
36 Lake, thence by the shore of said lake to the point
37 of beginning.

38 Moosehorn Game Sanctuary: The right-of-way of the
39 Maine Central Railroad from St. Croix Junction in
40 Calais, southerly to the Charlotte town line.

41 Narragansett Game Sanctuary: The following described
42 territory situated in the Town of Gorham, in the

1 County of Cumberland: Bounded on the north by the
2 right-of-way of the W. N. & P. division of the Boston
3 & Maine railroad; on the east by the Black Brook Road
4 or Scarboro Road, so called, in said Town of Gorham;
5 on the south by the Stroudwater River; and on the
6 west by South Street or South Gorham Road, so called,
7 in said Town of Gorham, containing 3,600 acres, more
8 or less. For provisions relating specifically to
9 Narragansett Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, sub-
10 section 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (4).

11 Ocean Park Game and Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
12 scribed territory situated in the Town of Old Orchard
13 Beach, in the County of York: Beginning at a point on
14 the easterly side of Fresh Water Cove Brook, so
15 called, where the same intersects the Boston and
16 Maine Railroad right-of-way; thence southerly along
17 said brook to its mouth where it joins the Goose Fare
18 Brook; thence southeasterly along said Goose Fare
19 Brook to its mouth; thence easterly and parallel with
20 the Atlantic Ocean and 50 feet in front of all bulk-
21 heads and houses fronting on the beach to the easterly
22 side of Tunis Avenue; thence northwesterly along
23 said avenue to the Boston and Maine Railroad right-
24 of-way; thence by said Boston and Maine right-of-way
25 to point of beginning.

26 Orrington Game Sanctuary: The following described
27 territory beginning at a point on the state aid road
28 No. 4, in Orrington, at the East Bucksport turn, ex-
29 tending in a southerly and southeasterly direction to
30 the county line; on the road leading to Thurston
31 Pond, to the Hancock County line; thence southwesterly
32 along said county line to the land of Harry Byard;
33 north along said line to the land of E. F. Bowden;
34 west on said line to the land of Frank Betts; northerly
35 on line of E. F. Bowden to land of Fred Bowden;
36 west on Fred Bowden's line to land of J. Betts;
37 northerly on line of Fred Bowden and J. Betts to line
38 of H. Byard; westerly on Byard's line and line of
39 Mary Gray to land of P. W. Gray; northerly on Gray's
40 line to land of J. Bowden heirs; northerly across
41 said land to the line of E. F. Bowden and J. W.
42 Bowden heirs; easterly on J. W. Bowden heirs' line to
43 the first mentioned bound. The commissioner may add
44 adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon appli-
45 cation of said adjacent property owners.

1 Pittston Farm Sanctuary: Pittston Farm, so called, in
2 Pittston Township, in the County of Somerset, being
3 all the fields, pastures and cultivated lands of said
4 farm.

5 Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape Elizabeth
6 Sanctuary: The following described territory: On the
7 112 acres of land, more or less, comprising Prout's
8 Neck, so called, in the Town of Scarborough, in the
9 County of Cumberland; or on Richmond's Island, so
10 called, in the Town of Cape Elizabeth, in said County
11 of Cumberland; or on the tract of land comprising
12 1,600 acres, more or less, situated in said Town of
13 Cape Elizabeth, and bounded as follows: Southeasterly
14 and southerly by the low low watermark of the Atlan-
15 tic Ocean, westerly by the low low watermark of the
16 Spurwink River, northerly by the Spurwink Road, so
17 called, leading from Spurwink Bridge to Bowery Beach,
18 easterly by a certain private road or way which runs
19 in a southerly direction from the aforesaid Spurwink
20 Road to said Bowery Beach, being the road which runs
21 in front of the dwelling house of one Charles L.
22 Jordan and along the easterly boundary of land of
23 said Charles L. Jordan, and along the westerly bound-
24 ary of land of the Great Pond Club, but not including
25 any portion of said Bowery Beach. For the purpose of
26 this paragraph, Richmond's Island shall include only
27 that portion of land above the mean high watermark
28 and the easterly portion, as defined by red painted
29 markers, of the causeway between Richmond's Island
30 and the mainland. For provisions relating specificall-
31 y to Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape Elizabeth
32 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
33 A, subparagraphs (3) and (4).

34 Rangeley Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin:
35 The following described tract or territory, situated
36 in Rangeley, in the County of Franklin, to wit: So
37 much of said Town of Rangeley as is bounded as fol-
38 lows: Southwesterly by Rangeley Lake; northwesterly
39 and northeasterly by route No. 16; and southeasterly
40 by the inlet to Rangeley Lake leading from Haley
41 Pond, so called. The territory above described being
42 so much of said Town of Rangeley, as lies between
43 Rangeley Lake, the outlet of Rangeley Lake, route No.
44 16 and said inlet to Rangeley Lake from Haley Pond.
45 This paragraph shall apply to that part of Hunter

1 Cove, so called, lying northerly of Hunter Cove
2 Bridge, so called.

3 Rangeley Lake Sanctuary: Rangeley Lake bounded as
4 follows: Beginning at Gilman's Point on the northerly
5 shore of Rangeley Lake; thence southerly across said
6 lake to the southwesterly corner of land of the
7 Rangeley Lake Hotel Corporation; thence northerly,
8 westerly and southerly around the shore of said
9 Rangeley Lake back to the original starting point.
10 Boats may pass through without incurring any penalty.

11 Rangeley Plantation Sanctuary: The following tracts
12 of land situated in Rangeley Plantation in the County
13 of Franklin: Land of the Maine Conference Association
14 of Seventh-day Adventists and the adjoining land now
15 or formerly owned by Mrs. Franklin B. Stahl, said
16 parcels laying southerly of Rangeley Lake. The com-
17 missioner may, after notice and public hearing, add
18 adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon appli-
19 cation of the owners of said adjacent property. For
20 provisions relating specifically to Rangeley Planta-
21 tion Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, para-
22 graph B, subparagraph (1).

23 Readfield and Winthrop Sanctuary: The waters of
24 Carleton Pond, so called, in the Towns of Readfield
25 and Winthrop in the County of Kennebec, and the lands
26 of the Augusta Water District adjacent to said pond
27 and located in said Towns of Readfield and Winthrop,
28 now owned or which may be hereafter acquired by said
29 district in furtherance of its chartered purposes.
30 For provisions relating specifically to Readfield and
31 Winthrop Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 7,
32 and subsection 8, paragraph B, subparagraphs (2) and
33 (3).

34 Salmon Pond Sanctuary: That territory lying within a
35 distance of 1/4 of a mile of Salmon Pond, which pond
36 is situated in the Town of Guilford, in the County of
37 Piscataquis, said pond being the source of water sup-
38 ply for the Dover-Foxcroft Water District, also all
39 the lands now owned by said Dover-Foxcroft Water Dis-
40 trict in Lots 3 and 4, Range 7, which lie outside of
41 the above 1/4 of a mile limit.

1 Somerset Game Sanctuary: The following described
2 tract or territory situated in Somerset County, the
3 same being in unorganized territory, and taking in
4 parts of Sapling Town, Misery Gore, Taunton and
5 Raynham Township, and including the whole of Sandbar
6 Tract, bounded and described as follows: The territory
7 from the highway, being route 15, east to low wa-
8 termark on Moosehead Lake between East Outlet and
9 West Outlet, bounded as follows: Beginning at the
10 junction of the low watermark of Moosehead Lake and
11 the northerly side of the East Outlet of said lake;
12 thence westerly by the northerly side of said East
13 Outlet to the highway, being route 15; thence north-
14 erly by said highway to the southerly side of the
15 West Outlet of said Moosehead Lake; thence easterly
16 by the southerly side of said West Outlet to low wa-
17 termark of Moosehead Lake; thence southerly by said
18 low watermark of Moosehead Lake to the point of be-
19 ginning.

20 Standish Sanctuary: The following described territory
21 in the Town of Standish in the County of Cumberland:
22 Beginning at the point where the Maine Central rail-
23 road crosses the Pequaket Trail in Steep Falls;
24 thence southerly and easterly by said Pequaket Trail,
25 the Oak Hill Road, so-called, and the so-called back
26 road from Steep Falls to Richville to its junction
27 with the Rich Mill Road, so-called; thence by said
28 Mill Road northeasterly to its junction with the road
29 leading from Sebago Lake to East Sebago; thence by
30 the last named road northerly to a point approximat-
31 ely 1 1/4 miles north of the Maine Central railroad
32 crossing; thence by a certain wood road westerly to
33 its junction with the Maine Central railroad; thence
34 by said railroad northwesterly to the point of begin-
35 ning. All roads and the Maine Central railroad right-
36 of-way which serve to bound said Standish Game
37 Sanctuary shall be a part of said sanctuary. For pro-
38 visions relating specifically to Standish Sanctuary,
39 see section 7654, subsection 6.

40 Stanwood Wildlife Sanctuary: Beginning on Route 3 in
41 Ellsworth at the northeast corner of the Stanwood
42 Wildlife Sanctuary and the southeast corner of the
43 Animal Medical Center; thence southerly 795 feet on
44 the highway to an iron pipe, being the northeast cor-
45 ner of the Luchini lot; thence westerly 363 feet

1 along Luchini's north line to an iron pipe; thence S
2 6° 40' W 716 feet to an iron pipe, abutting Luchini,
3 Grossman's Lumber, and the Ellsworth Water Company
4 water tower; thence N 81° 23' W 1699 feet, abutting
5 the Jordan brothers' lot to a stake; thence N 6° 40'
6 E 511 feet to a stake, abutting Khanbegian; thence N
7 79° 59' W 1432 feet to a stake, abutting Khanbegian;
8 thence westerly 330 feet to a stake, abutting John
9 Dorgan; thence S 79° 59' E 720 feet to an iron pipe,
10 abutting John E. Partridge; thence N 10° 6' E 659
11 feet to an iron pipe, abutting John E. Partridge and
12 Beatrice Jones; thence S 79° 59' E 1342 feet to an
13 iron pipe, abutting Harry S. Jones, III; thence N 6°
14 08' E 326 feet to an iron pipe, abutting Harry S.
15 Jones, III; thence N 80° 45' E 60 feet to an iron
16 pipe, abutting the Maine Coast Mall; thence S 6° 08'
17 W 87 feet to an iron pipe, abutting Dow Pontiac;
18 thence N 69° 50' E 340 feet to an iron pipe, abutting
19 Dow Pontiac; thence S 31° 04' E 371.75 feet to an
20 iron pipe, abutting Ellsworth Agway and Branch Pond
21 Marine; thence N 80° 42' E 84.5 feet to an iron pipe,
22 abutting Ellsworth Car Wash; thence S 4° 45' W 219.8
23 feet to an iron pipe, abutting Animal Medical Center;
24 thence N 69° 50' E 345 feet to an iron pipe, abutting
25 Animal Medical Center and being the point of begin-
26 ning, containing 100 acres more or less. The commis-
27 sioner may add adjacent property to the game
28 sanctuary upon application of the adjacent property
29 owners.

30 Thorncrag-Stanton Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
31 scribed territory, situated in the City of Lewiston,
32 County of Androscoggin, and the Town of Monmouth,
33 County of Kennebec, to wit: Bounded on the north by
34 land of H. Osmond Wood; on the east by land formerly
35 owned by Benjamin Thorn; on the south by the road
36 leading from Barker's Mills schoolhouse to Thorne's
37 Corner; on the west by land of H. Osmond Wood and
38 George H. McGibbon; said tract being wholly situated
39 within the City of Lewiston in said County of
40 Androscoggin and containing 45 acres, more or less.
41 The most northerly corner of land of the estate of
42 George K. Davis, bounded and described as follows,
43 to wit: On the northwest by land of the so-called Ham
44 Farm; on the northeast by Pleasant Street; on the
45 southwest by land of Joseph Breault; and on the
46 southeast by a line extending northeasterly from the

1 easterly corner of said Breault's land and being a
2 continuation of the southeast boundary of said
3 Breault's land, containing 2 acres, more or less,
4 situated in the City of Lewiston, in the County of
5 Androscoggin. Beginning at a maple tree at the south-
6 east corner of the Ricker farm, now or formerly so
7 called, thence running west, northwest 244 rods to a
8 stooping cedar in what is now or was formerly a
9 swamp, thence south 22 1/2° west, 122 rods to a stake
10 near Wyman Pond now or formerly so called; thence
11 east, southeast 244 rods to the lot first conveyed by
12 a deed from Benjamin Woodbury to Mary A. Davis;
13 thence by said lot above described as first conveyed
14 by said deed, 122 rods to the point of beginning,
15 containing about 132 acres, more or less, situated in
16 the Town of Monmouth, in the County of Kennebec.

17 Tomhegan Game Sanctuary: The following territory in
18 Township 1, Range 2, N. B. K. P., commonly known as
19 Tomhegan Town, in the County of Somerset, described
20 as follows: Beginning at a cedar post and stones, the
21 post being marked PRESERVE C/W 1931, standing on the
22 line which is the division line between the land
23 owned by the Great Northern Paper Company and that
24 owned by the trust estate of F. W. Rollins, standing
25 on the westerly shore of Socatean Bay in Moosehead
26 Lake; thence westerly on said division line 1 mile
27 and 160 rods to a cedar post and stones, the post be-
28 ing marked PRESERVE C 1931; thence southerly at right
29 angle to said division line 250 rods to a cedar post
30 and stones, the post being marked PRESERVE C/W 1931
31 and standing on the northerly shore of Tomhegan Bay
32 in Moosehead Lake; thence easterly and northerly
33 along the shore of Moosehead Lake around Socatean
34 Point, so called, to the point of beginning and con-
35 taining 700 acres, more or less.

36 Wells Sanctuary: The following described tract or
37 territory, situated in the Town of Wells, in the
38 County of York:

39 A certain tract of land, bounded and described as
40 follows: On the east by the Atlantic Ocean; on the
41 south by the Drake Island Road, so called; on the
42 west by the U. S. Number 1 highway, so called; on the
43 north by the town line of Kennebunk and Wells.

1 Wells and York Game Sanctuary: The following de-
2 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Wells and
3 York in York County; beginning at a point on highway
4 No. 1 where the Josias River meets said highway No. 1
5 in the Town of Wells, thence southwesterly along said
6 Josias River to the Maine Turnpike in the Town of
7 York, thence northerly along said Maine Turnpike to
8 the Agamenticus Road overpass; thence westerly across
9 said overpass by Agamenticus Road to the North Vil-
10 lage Road; thence northerly along said North Village
11 Road to Ogunquit-North Berwick Road, thence easterly
12 along said Ogunquit-North Berwick Road to highway No.
13 1 in the Town of Wells, thence southerly along high-
14 way No. 1 to the point of beginning in the Town of
15 Wells.

16 Willow Water Game Sanctuary: The following named ter-
17 ritory, on the following described properties, lo-
18 cated in the Town of Perry:

19 Beginning on the county road on the westerly line of
20 the Reed Farm, so called, now or formerly owned by
21 Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail, and thence running north 4°
22 east, following said line, 32 rods to a marked tree;
23 thence 75° west 20 rods to a stake; thence south 4°
24 east 32 rods to the county road; thence easterly by
25 the county road to the place of beginning. The same
26 being the building lot formerly owned by the late
27 John W. Trott and containing 4 acres, more or less.

28 And one other lot or parcel of land lying and being
29 on the northerly side of the county road leading from
30 the Eastport-Perry Bridge to Pembroke and bounded and
31 described as follows, to wit: Beginning at the south-
32 west corner of land formerly of the John W. Trott es-
33 tate and thence running northerly on the west line of
34 said Trott land to the northwest corner thereof;
35 thence easterly on the north line of said Trott land
36 to land now or formerly of Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail,
37 formerly of John Reddington; thence north 1° east
38 along the west line of said McPhail land to land now
39 or formerly of the Charles J. Trott estate; thence
40 westerly on the south line of said Trott land 62
41 rods; thence northerly on the westerly line of said
42 Trott land 48 rods to the Morrison lot, so called;
43 thence westerly on the said Morrison lot to land now
44 or formerly of W. W. Brown; thence south 1/2° west

1 200 rods to the county road; thence easterly on said
2 county road 77 rods to the place of beginning, con-
3 taining in all 107 acres, more or less, being part of
4 lots numbered 29 and 30 according to the plan of the
5 Town of Perry.

6 And one other lot or parcel of land known as the pas-
7 ture lot formerly the Wm. H. Brown Farm, bounded gen-
8 erally as follows, to wit: On the north by land for-
9 merly of S. Frost; on the east by land of Trott, on
10 the south by the county road leading to Pembroke and
11 on the west by land of M. Conley and land of others,
12 names unknown, the above described lots being known
13 as the Elijah Loring Farm in said Perry.

14 And a certain lot of land bounded on the north by
15 land of the late John McCarty; on the east by Frost's
16 Cove; on the south by lands formerly of Lucinda Frost
17 and of Lewis D. Frost; and on the west by lands of
18 the late John Morrison, William Anderson and the late
19 John McCarty, containing 75 acres, more or less.

20 And one other lot or parcel of land bounded and de-
21 scribed as follows, to wit: On the east by lots num-
22 bered 19 and 20; southerly by land of the late John
23 Loring and the Russell lot, so called; westerly by
24 lots numbered 10 and 11; and northerly by the William
25 Anderson lot, and land formerly owned by the late
26 Aaron Frost.

27 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
28 and described as follows, to wit: Bounded on the
29 north by road leading from county road, to the field
30 on the west; on the east by the county road leading
31 from Eastport to Calais, on the south and the west by
32 land of Lucinda Frost, afterwards conveyed to Jennie
33 Frost; said lot being 10 rods on the county road and
34 8 rods back from the road.

35 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
36 and described as follows, to wit: On the east by the
37 county road leading from Eastport to Robbinston; on
38 the south by land formerly owned by John A. Frost, on
39 the west by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost and on
40 the north by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost.

1 The owner of the properties included within the Wil-
2 low Water Game Sanctuary shall enclose the same with
3 a suitable fence and shall cause the erection of
4 suitable signs on or near said sanctuary indicating
5 that no hunting is permitted thereon. Near the center
6 of said game sanctuary such owner is authorized to
7 construct a 15-acre pond for the propagation of wa-
8 terfowl, principally wood duck, teal and blacks. For
9 provisions relating specifically to Willow Water Game
10 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
11 A, subparagraph (1).

12 York Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin: The
13 following named territory; on the property of the
14 following named persons, to wit: On land of J. Lewis
15 York and on land of Yorks; said game sanctuary being
16 in the northwest corner of Dallas Plantation, and
17 bounded as follows, to wit: West by the east line of
18 the Town of Rangeley; north by the south line of Lang
19 Plantation; east by the west line of the public lot
20 in Dallas Plantation; and south by land of Furbish,
21 Goodspeed Company and land of the heirs of Henry
22 Bliss, containing 539 acres, more or less. This game
23 sanctuary shall be called the York Game Sanctuary.

24 For provisions relating specifically to York Game
25 Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin, see section
26 7654, subsection 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (2).

27 STATEMENT OF FACT

28 The purpose of this bill is to establish the In-
29 dian Point Wildlife Sanctuary in Georgetown.
