AN ACT Relating to Adult Education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA § 8606, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 693, §§5 and 8, is repealed.

Sec. 2. 20-A MRSA §8606-A is enacted to read:

STATEMENT OF FACT

Public school adult education plays a critical role in the State's ability to provide educational 18 19 20 opportunities to all its citizens. In order to 21 maximize the impact of adult education, changes need to be made in reimbursement procedures and rates so 22 that local adult education programs may continue to 23 meet the increasing needs of adult students, particu-24 larly those who are economically and educationally 25 26 disadvantaged.
