1 2 3	AN ACT Concerning Penalties for Caribou and Big Game Violations.
4 5	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
6 7	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §7901, sub-§2, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 177, §1, is amended to read:
8 9 10 11 12 13	2. Class D crimes. A violation of section 7406, subsection 1 as it applies to deer; of section 7406, subsection 5; of section 7406, subsection 10, when the wild animal or bird was taken in violation of section 7406, subsection 5; of section 7458, subsection 1, 2 or 3; or of section 7464, subsection 1, 2 or 8, is a Class D crime, provided that the convict-

- ed person shall be imprisoned for not less than 3 days for the first offense and for not less than 10 days for each succeeding offense, this imprisonment not to be suspended, and shall be fined not less than \$500 \$1,000, this fine not to be suspended.
  - Sec. 2. 12 MRSA  $\S7901$ , sub- $\S\S2-A$  and 3-A are enacted to read:
- 2-A. Bear. A violation of section 7406, subsection 1, as it applies to bear, or section 7452, subsections 3, 4 or 9 is a Class D crime. A convicted person shall be imprisoned for not more than 180 days and shall be fined not less than \$1,000. This fine is not to be suspended.

Any person found guilty of vio-15 lating section 7456-B shall be assessed a fine of not 16 less than \$2,000 or more than \$10,000 and given a 17 jail sentence of not less than 30 days or more than 6 18 months, which penalties may not be suspended.

- 4-A. Dogs chasing or attacking deer. A violation of section 7505, subsection 3, paragraph B A or B, is a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not less than \$2θθ \$500 nor more than \$5θθ \$1,000 may be adjudged, this forfeiture not to be suspended.

- 8. Wild turkey. A violation of section 74567 31 subsections-37-47-5-and-67-as-they-apply-to--turkeys, 32 7469, subsection 1, 2 or 9 is a Class E crime. A con-33 34 victed person shall be fined not less than \$200 \$500 and this fine is not to be suspended. In addition, a 35 convicted person shall be fined \$200 \$500 for each 36 turkey illegally possessed or killed and this fine is 37 38 not to be suspended.

### STATEMENT OF FACT

2	The purpose of this new draft is to penalize per-
3	sons who hunt or possess caribou and to increase the
4	penalties for big game hunting violations. Section 1
5	increases the penalties for big game hunting viola-
6	tions from \$500 to \$1,000. Section 2 increases the
7	penalties for bear hunting violations to \$1,000 and
8	sets out the penalties for hunting or possessing car-
9	ibou at a fine of not less than \$2,000 or more than
10	\$10,000 and given a jail sentence of not less than 30
11	days or more than 6 months.

Section 3 repeals the provisions for dogs chasing deer and section 4 inserts this prohibition into the following subsection. Section 4 also increases the penalties for dogs chasing or attacking deer. Section 5 increases the penalties for wild turkey hunting violations and specifically references the wild turkey provisions in the law.

The penalties for big game hunting violations have not been increased in 10 years and the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife feels they no longer serve as a deterrent. The large fines for possessing or hunting caribou are enacted to ensure that the Caribou Restoration Project can proceed without human interference.
