6 7 8 9	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and		

Whereas, the Joint Select Committee on Economic Development finds that the State has not adequately met its education and job training needs and its programs to meet these needs are excessively fragmented; and

Whereas, the nature of employment will change drastically by the year 2000 as the economy continues its shift away from an industrial base to an information and service-based economy requiring more flexibility and adaptability within the work force; and

Whereas, employers in the State are becoming increasingly frustrated by an inability to locate and attract employees with adequate education and training, hindering economic growth; and

Whereas, the Job Training Partnership Act and Welfare Employment, Education and Training Programs are serving only approximately 5% and 20% of their eligible recipients, respectively; and

Whereas, the relatively scant financial resources dedicated to education, training and retraining needs of the work force are scattered throughout State Government; and

Whereas, coordination is lacking, duplication of effort is evident and a comprehensive, rational state policy does not exist for these human resource development programs; and

Whereas, 3 state departments, the University of Maine System, the Maine Maritime Academy and the Maine Vocational-Technical Institute System in addition to at least 10 separate policy-making and advisory councils, committees or boards are involved in approximately 15 service delivery and administrative programs in this area; and

Whereas, the joint select committee would like to have a plan to address these concerns implemented prior to the adjournment of the First Regular Session of the 113th Legislature; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Governor's Report. Resolved: That the Governor report to the Joint Standing Committee on Economic Development prior to May 1, 1987, with his plan for the more effective delivery and coordination of human resource development programs in the State; and be it further

Report guidelines. Resolved: That the Governor's report and the plan shall consider, at a minimum, the following.

- 1. To the maximum extent practical, all state funded or administered job training programs shall be consolidated within the Department of Labor. Exempted from this provision are programs under the auspices of the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, the University of Maine System, the Maine Maritime Academy and the Maine Vocational-Technical Institute System.
- 2. To the maximum extent practical, the multitude of councils, boards and committees presently engaged on behalf of the State in job training activities shall be consolidated.
 - A. The successor organization, hereafter referred to as the State Council, shall use subcommittees to give particular focus to such areas as welfare recipient participation and occupational information retrieval systems. In this manner, the need for separate free-standing organizations to cover areas such as these can be obviated.
 - B. In those instances when organizations cannot be merged, dual appointments shall be considered as a means of enhancing coordination.
 - C. In achieving a consolidation, consideration shall be given to combining, at a minimum, the Maine Job Training Council, the State Advisory Council, the Maine Aid to Families with Dependent Children Coordinating Committee, the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee, the State Apprenticeship and Training Council and the Displaced Homemakers Advisory Council.

- D. The new State Council shall be charged with the responsibility of integrating the planning and delivery of job training programs in the State.
- 5 E. The new State Council shall be fiscally at-6 tached to the Department of Labor.
- 7 F. The State Council shall approve the expendi-8 ture of job training funds by the regional ser-9 vice providers.
- 10 3. The planning and delivery of job training l1 services shall be consolidated at the regional level.
- 12 A. Regions shall be consistent with county 13 boundaries and, to the maximum extent practical, 14 shall adhere to sub-state planning and economic 15 regions currently prescribed by executive order.
- B. Those agencies designated by the Private Industry Councils under the Job Training Partnership Act shall be responsible for service delivery and planning. When the State is the service provider in a region under the Job Training Partnership Act, a regional agency shall be designated by the Private Industry Councils.

- C. To the maximum extent practical, the regional agencies shall use their financial resources to purchase educational and training services from existing local public school adult and community education programs, the Maine Vocational-Technical Institute System and the University of Maine System. If these agencies are unable to meet service needs, the regional agency, as a last resort, shall be in a position to be direct provider of services.
- D. Each year, the regional agencies shall prepare and submit an operating plan drafted in accordance with guidelines promulgated by the State Council. Regional plans shall be forwarded to the Private Industry Councils which shall develop and present final plans to the State Council for approval. The plan shall specify goals, objectives, scope of work, time liens, staffing, bud-

- 1 get, performance measurements and their relation-2 ship to state and regional economic development 3 strategies. Efforts to maximize coordination 4 with the adult basic education program, the Maine 5 Vocational-Technical Institute System and б University of Maine System shall be noted as well 7 as obstacles to the coordination and methods for 8 reducing these obstacles.
- 9 The funding made available to each region shall be allocated on a formula basis that 10 11 flects need as defined by the State Council. State Council shall reallocate funds if one re-12 13 gion does not utilize its entitlement.
- 14 Disincentives which discourage participation 15 job training programs shall be reduced. disincentives include the lack of day care for dren of employees, the lack of health coverage for disabled and welfare recipients and the transportation for those without their own vehicle.

- 20 State financial support for job training 21 shall be increased once a coordinated and integrated 22 service planning and delivery system is instituted at 23 the state and regional levels.
 - Career guidance and assessment services fered by the State shall be offered in a more coherent and comprehensive manner. The Commissioner Labor, the Commissioner of Human Services and the Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services jointly determine the most efficient means of shall addressing the guidance and assessment needs various adult client groups.
- 32 Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited 33 the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when 34 approved.
