1 2 3	AN ACT to Continue the Agricultural Viability Program.
4 5	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
6 7	<pre>Sec. 1. 7 MRSA Pt. 1-A, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 482, §2, is repealed.</pre>
8 9	Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §314, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 482, $\S 2$, is amended to read:
10 11	§314. Establishing a program for identifying region- al opportunities
12 13	In response to these legislative findings, the commissioner shall establish a pilot program to re-

view and identify the agricultural opportunities and

constraints in up-to-4 selected regions of the State and, to the maximum extent possible, to administer the department's programs in these selected regions so as to address these opportunities and constraints. In this pilot program, the commissioner shall:

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- 1. Public participation. Ensure that the agricultural community and public in general have the opportunity to participate in the assessment of regional opportunities and constraints and in any redirection of programs resulting from the assessment; and
- Local lead agencies. By rule establish criteria for selecting up-to-4 regions for inclusion in this pilot program and designating local lead agencies to coordinate public input and assist in this regional assessment, provided that preference shall be given to local soil and water conservation districts as lead agencies which meet designation crite-Regions shall be selected so as to reflect the agricultural, geographic and demographic diversity of the State and the capacity of potential local lead agencies to participate in this pilot program. commissioner shall provide, not later than August 1st each year, notice of the availability of funding schedule for accepting applications for selection of local lead agencies to review and assess regional agricultural opportunities in areas of the State in which the assessments have not yet been carried out.
 - A. The department shall provide the local lead agencies with current information about agricultural production, processing and marketing within the State, the demand for state agricultural products and the State's market position relative to its competitors.
 - B. Local lead agencies shall hold hearings and public meetings and shall collect and assess information on agricultural resources, problems and needs in their local areas, including at a minimum:
 - (1) The land base currently used or suitable for agricultural production, its nature and extent, use and ownership;

Within one year following completion of a regional assessment, the commissioner shall consider implementation of appropriate state programs to respond to regional needs identified in the assessment. In determining whether and when to initiate implementation of the programs, the commissioner shall consider the effect of implementation on agriculture as a whole, on agriculture in other parts of the State and on existing departmental programs.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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The Agricultural Viability Program, established by the Maine Agriculture Viability Act of 1985, is a "pilot" program, operating in 4 regions and scheduled to end June 30, 1987.

Under that program, local lead agencies have been 30 31 established in the St. John Valley, Washington 32 Hancock Counties, 9 towns along the Androscoggin and Sandy River Valley between Farmington and Auburn and 33 34 the agricultural areas of Somerset, Piscataquis 35 and Penobscot Counties. In each of these 36 have been numerous meetings among farmers and 37 others to assess future opportunities for 38 Each region is now preparing recommendations ture.

1 2 3 4 5 6	about specific actions to enhance its agricultural potential. An unexpected result of this assessment process has been the extent to which each region identified is interested in pursuing initiatives to address special problems facing that particular region.
7 8	This bill will continue the Agricultural Viability Program for 4 more years. In the 4 pilot

Viability Program for 4 more years. In the 4 pilot regions already established, continuation provides the opportunity for state assistance to implement activities of special significance to agriculture in each particular region. Establishment of 2 more "regions" in the next 4 years is also contemplated.
