can create, through their own efforts, a system to provide needed child care.

This bill recognizes that State Government must strive to keep in place existing child care programs and efforts, by providing much needed cost-of-living increases to child care workers funded with social services block grants, and by increasing the very low salaries of these child care workers.

The bill also recognizes that child care is crucial to Maine's economic development, and therefore the bill appropriates money to help dislocated workers and retraining employees get the child care they need to complete their training.

The bill also requires the Governor to consider the child care needs of Maine's workers and industries in planning and carrying out economic development strategies.

This bill, as well, provides a program in the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, to help local communities and school districts develop the latchkey programs and other innovative child care programs for which the citizens of those communities and school districts are willing to work.

The bill also provides that the Office of Child Care Coordination in the Department of Human Services will coordinate state efforts concerning child care, so that the State provides an efficient and unified approach to the State's child care needs.

In sum, this bill provides the basis for State Government to assist citizens, localities and businesses to begin meeting their urgent child care needs.

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
