STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to reinstate the requirement that pesticide manufacturers and distribu-

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36 37 tors pay an annual registration fee for each pesticide product they intend to market in this State. It will continue the registration fee at the same level established for calendar year 1987.

In 1986, the 112th Legislature responded to the board's request for additional funding with a one-time increase of \$15 for calendar year 1987. The intent, at least of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, was for the 113th Legislature to evaluate how the board should be funded in the future since its activities benefited the entire citizenry. Through an inadvertent error, the requirement that registration fees be paid was eliminated as of the end of calendar year 1987.

Registration funds traditionally have supported approximately 54% of the board's normal operating budget while the balance has come from the General Fund, 17%, and shrinking federal grants, 29% in 1986. It is essential that authority be restored so registration fees may be charged on an annual basis following 1987.

In the past 4 years, the Legislature has delegated additional responsibilities to the board for such issues as obsolete pesticides, returnable containers and spray drift. At the same time, federal support has been declining while public interest has remained high. Consequently, the board has experienced difficulty in terms of both manpower and funding to meet all its demands. This bill, therefore, seeks to continue the fee at the \$75 level so that the 1987 level of services can be continued and new responsibilities carried out.

The board is currently in the process of promulgating rules to establish application standards so that drift to sensitive areas is minimized. Once adopted, a major educational effort will be needed to inform applicators how to comply with the rules. This bill will allow creation of a new position that would not only be responsible for certification and licensing activities, but for working with the Cooperative Extension Service to develop appropriate training programs. Since the board is on record as believing that education rather than enforcement is

the most effective mechanism for obtaining applicator compliance, this action should result in not only more respect for the pesticide laws, but less controversy over pesticide issues.

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
