AN ACT Relating to the Maine Milk Commission.

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3 4	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
5 6 7	Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §2952, as amended by PL 1985, c. 785, Pt. B, §48, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
8	§2952. Organization
9	1. Established. The Maine Milk Commission, as
0	established by Title 5, section 12004, subsection 6,
1	shall consist of 7 members one of whom shall be the
2	Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources
7	or a designee ex officio

1	Members; qualifications. All members of the
2	commission shall be residents of the State. The 4
3	members, other than the Commissioner of Agriculture,
4	Food and Rural Resources, shall be appointed by the
5	Governor, subject to review by the joint standing
6	committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over
7	agriculture and confirmation by the Legislature.
8	They shall serve for a term of 4 years and until
9	their successors have been duly appointed and quali-
10	fied. In addition to the limitations of Title 5,
11	section 18, none of the members appointed by the Gov-
12	ernor to the commission, except as provided in sub-
13	section 3, may at the time of appointment or while
14	serving as a member or employee of the commission, do
15	any of the following with a firm which provides any
16	professional or other service for any producer, deal-
17	er, store or other entity whose activities are sub-
18	ject to the jurisdiction of the commission:

- A. Transact any business, other than retail purchases of milk;
- 21 B. Have any professional connections or rela-22 tions;

- C. Hold any interest or stock or securities in such a firm; or
- D. Provide services to or be a member of such a firm.
- members of the Maine Milk Commission appointed by the Governor shall represent the dairy farmers and the milk dealers of the State.
 - A. One dairy farmer representative shall be chosen for a 4-year term by the Governor for appointment to the commission from a nomination slate identifying the candidates with the highest number of votes and the 2nd highest number of votes in a special election for this nomination. Dairy farmers from this State who are listed on an official register to be established and maintained by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources may seek office, are eligible to vote or may sign petitions for nomination. Only

2	dairy processing plants in this State or who par-
3	ticipate in the Maine Milk Pool shall appear on
4	the official register.
5	B. One milk dealer shall be chosen for a 4-year
6	term by the Governor for appointment to the com-
7	mission from a nomination slate identifying the
8	processor with the highest number of votes and
9	the dealer with the 2nd highest number of votes
10	in a special election for this nomination. Own-
11	ers or managers of dairy processing plants in
12	this State who are licensed by the Maine Milk
13	Commission may seek office, are eligible to vote
14	or may sign petitions for nomination. Subdealers
15	are not eligible to participate in the special
16	election.
17	The Maine Milk Commission shall conduct the spe-
18	cial elections in accordance with Title 21-A. The
19	commission may establish, by rule, special procedures
20	and guidelines necessary for the proper implementa-
21	tion of this section and section 2952-A.
22	The members of the commission shall elect a

 of dairy farmers who sell milk to licensed

The members of the commission shall elect a chairman. With the approval of the commission, the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources may employ, subject to the Civil Service Law, a secretary and such officers, clerks, assistants and other employees as necessary. The commission may employ such expert, professional or other assistance as the commission deems necessary. Legal services and other services of experts shall be performed as far as possible by the existing state departments, including the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, the Department of Human Services and the Department of the Attorney General.

When vacancies occur on the commission, the Governor shall fill only the 4 seats for which he has unrestricted appointment authority. The remaining 2 seats shall be filled from nominees by special election as provided in this section.

Members of the commission shall be compensated as provided in Title 5, chapter 379, that compensation to be determined by the Governor. The cost of admin-

1 2 3 4 5	istration of the commission, including expenses and compensation of members, shall not exceed the amount of fees collected under this chapter. The commission shall be furnished a suitable office in the State Capitol with necessary equipment and supplies.
6 7 8 9 10	The commission shall hold regular meetings on the 3rd Thursday of each calendar month. The chairman shall call special meetings of the commission whenever requested in writing by 2 or more members of the commission.

12 13	§2952-A. Election of members to the Maine Milk Com- mission
14 15 16 17	In order to properly conduct the elections which are necessary to provide the Maine Milk Commission with representation from dairy farmers and milk dealers, the following guidelines are to be observed.
18 19 20 21	1. Petition requirements. A nomination petition shall be on a form developed and provided by the Maine Milk Commission and shall conform to the following requirements.
22	A. The form must contain:
23	(1) The name of one candidate;
24 25	(2) Place of residence of the candidate; and
26	(3) The office sought,
27 28 29	B. A nomination petition may be signed only by those qualified, as specified in section 2952, subsection 3, paragraph A.
30 31 32 33	C. A qualified voter must personally sign his name in a manner to satisfy the executive director of the Maine Milk Commission. Either the voter or the circulator of the petition shall print the voter's name as well.

	1 2 3 4	D. The voter or the circulator of the petition must print the voter's street address or rural route number, post office box number and the municipality of residence.
	5 6 7 8 9 10 11	E. A prospective candidate seeking election to the Maine Milk Commission as a dairy farmer representative must obtain a minimum of 25 signatures. A prospective candidate seeking election to the Maine Milk Commission as a representative of the dairy processing industry must obtain a minimum of 5 signatures.
	12 13 14 15 16	Nomination papers will be made available on November lst and the filing deadline for the nomination petition is December 1st. The commission shall refer to Title 21-A, section 354, in establishing petition requirements.
	17 18 19 20	2. Balloting. After nomination petitions have been returned to the Maine Milk Commission, an elec- tion ballot will be prepared containing the following items in the following order:
	21 22 23	A. The names of the candidates arranged alpha- betically with the last name first and without any title; and
1	24	B. The municipality of residence.
	25 26 27	Election ballots will be mailed to all qualified voters, as specified in section 2952, subsection 3, paragraphs A and B, not later than December 15th.
	28 29 30	In developing ballot and balloting procedures, the Maine Milk Commission shall refer for guidance to Title 21-A, sections 102 and 103.
	31 32	3. Method of voting. Voting shall be as follows.
\	33 34 35 36 37 38	A. A qualified voter shall receive his ballot from the Maine Milk Commission by mail, mark his ballot and return his ballot to the Maine Milk Commission by mail. He shall receive no assistance in marking his ballot, the following procedures apply.

1 2 3 4 5	(1) While the voter is marking the ballot, there may be no communication between the voter and any other individual as to the person or question for which the voter is to vote.
6 7 8 9 10	(2) After the voter has completed marking his ballot, he must then seal the ballot in its return envelope and complete the affidavit on the envelope. No notary or witness certification is required.
11 12 13 14 15	(3) The voter must then insert the ballot in the enclosed addressed envelope and mail it back to the Maine Milk Commission or deliver it in person to be received no later than the last Friday of January at 5 p.m.
16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23	(4) On the Monday following the deadline for submission of ballots, the Maine Milk Commission shall convene a special meeting to oversee the inspection and counting of the ballots. The count will be conducted under the observation of the public, but no person except those authorized by the chairman of the Maine Milk Commission may touch any ballot.
25 26 27 28	(5) When the count is completed, materials, ballots and ballot sheets shall be sealed and retained for a period of at least 10 years.
29 30 31 32 33 34	(6) The executive director shall record the official returns of the election and certify to the Secretary of State the official results. These official results shall be open to the public as soon as the count is completed and the results have been announced.
35 36 37 38	(7) In case of a recount, the ballots or ballot cards shall be recounted manually under the supervision of the Secretary of State.

This bill increases the size of the Maine Milk 3 Commission by 2 seats. One seat allows for represen-4 tation from the dairy farmer and the other enables a 5 representative of the dairy processing industry to 6 participate in commission affairs. These dairy rep-7 resentatives shall be chosen by the Governor 8 nomination slate which is developed as a result of special elections. With dairy farmers only voting for the farmer candidates and with owners and manag-9 10 11 ers of dairy plants voting for the milk dealers can-12 didates, the Governor shall choose between the candidates with the highest number of votes and the 2nd 13 14 highest number of votes.

The method of election is determined in this bill and the Maine Milk Commission is given authority to establish special election procedures by rule.

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
