Whereas, a study of water supply allocation is needed for consideration by the Second Regular Ses-11 sion of the 113th Legislature; and

Whereas, in order to report by December 1, 1987, the Public Utilities Commission must begin its work promptly; and

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Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Findings. Resolved: That the Legislature finds 8 that there is competition and uncertainty surrounding 9 the allocation of water resources among water utili-10 ties and others within the State. Water is essential for drinking water supplies, residential, agricultural, industrial and recreational use and many other 11 12 13 Although water is generally abundant in purposes. 14 the State, it is not unlimited and is in short supply 15 in some areas. There has been much attention paid 16 over the last 20 years to preservation of water qual-17 It is time to begin addressing the issues of water quantity, as the arid states have had 18 years ago; and be it further 19

Resolved: That the Public Utilities Commission shall conduct a study of water 21 22 supply and allocation and report to the Governor and 23 the Legislature with its findings and recommenda-24 tions, including legislative recommendations, if any, 25 by December 1, 1987. The commission shall consider 26 the various issues of water rights under statutory 27 and common law, including, for example, whether there 28 should be limits placed on such activities as export 29 of water from one watershed to another, export of wa-3.0 ter out of the State, use of water from ponds of less 31 than 10 acres and of ground water on and off 32 user's land. It shall consider whether municipali-33 ties have any interest in water which is within their 34 borders, but not related to municipally owned 35 The study shall also review water conservation prac-36 tices to identify available techniques and 37 application. The commission shall consider whether, in case of scarce supply and competing uses, 38 there should be a standard order of priorities 39 40 might be applied. 19 STATEMENT OF FACT

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The new draft requires a study of water supply and allocation like the original bill, but instead of creating a special commission, the new draft has the study done by the Public Utilities Commission, with assistance from other state agencies and input from interested parties. The Public Utilities Commission will report to the Legislature, December 1, 1987. The Joint Standing Committee on Utilities will review the study and introduce legislation if appropriate.
