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1 2	AN ACT to Amend the Sardine Tax.
3 4 5	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis- lature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
6 7 8 9	Whereas, the 8-month sardine packing season begins in June and the financial and administrative changes should be in effect as the season commences and be consistent throughout the season; and
10 11 12 13	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preser-

- vation of the public peace, health and safety; now,
 therefore,
- 3 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 4 follows:
- 5 Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §4151, sub-§§5 and 6 are enacted 6 to read:
- 5. Kippers. "Kippers" means all filets packed in hermetically sealed containers which are not classified as sardines, but have herring as their predominant contents.
- 11 6. Steaks. "Steaks" means all laterally cut
 12 portions packed in hermetically sealed containers
 13 which are not classified as sardines, but have
 14 herring as their predominant contents.
- 17 §4155. Inspection; conformity with federal acts; branding; embargo and condemnation

19 The Commissioner of Agriculture shall by adequate 20 inspection, by such methods, including sampling pro-21 cedures, and at such times including before, during and after packing, as he may from time to time deem 22 23 appropriate, see that sardines are packed in conform-24 ity with the requirements of the Federal 25 Drug Act, the laws of this State, including this chapter, and the rules and regulations promulgated or 26 27 established thereunder by the commissioner,-and-shall determine--the--grade--or--quality--of--each--lot--of 28 29 sardines--for--which-he-shall-have-established-grades 30 under-section-4157. He shall, in a manner consistent 31 with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, 32 uniform rules and regulations, which shall have the effect of law, for carrying out this chapter and 33 34 insuring that sardines are packed in a sanitary envi-35 ronment and manner and for the sanitary storage and 36 conditions of packing media, and may fix standards of 37 quality-in-addition-to-standards-fixed--by--law. 38 shall authorize the persons packing sardines in con-39 formity with the requirements of this chapter to mark the container of said sardines with a statement 40

Any sardines falsely marked shall be deemed 4 be misbranded, and any person, firm, corporation, as-5 sociation or society who shall misbrand or falsely 6 mark any container of sardines or sell or offer 7 sale such misbranded containers shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 for each container

The commissioner may issue a certificate for each lot of sardines, as defined in the applicable plan on file with him, stating the fact of his inspection, the date of inspection, the code, the of containers in the lot, the number of cans inspected, and-the-quality-or-grade-of-said-lot; said certificate shall be prima facie evidence of the facts therein stated. Certificates shall be issued only to those packers who make written request to the commissioner, which requests must state that the plicant applies for certificates for the entire seasonal output of the year in which the application made, or for the entire output of the balance of such

said sardines.

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44 45 season if the application is made after the season has begun, and such application shall include all plants operated by the individual, corporation or company making the application.

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The commissioner shall employ subordinate inspectors, sufficient in numbers, so that adequate inspection can be performed. It shall be the duty of said inspectors to make adequate and uniform and impartial inspection of all the places, shops and factories in the State, wherever sardines are packed for sale, and for this purpose such inspectors shall have free access, ingress and egress at all reasonable hours to any sardine packing plant, may open any case or container and may, upon tendering the market price, take samples therefrom.

Whenever the commissioner or any duly authorized agent of the commissioner has reasonable cause to believe that sardines, kippers or steaks are packed in violation of any of the provisions of this chapter, or regulations promulgated under authority of chapter or Title 36, section 4701, or that the finished product does not meet the standards and requirements of such chapter and regulations, the commissioner or any duly authorized agent of the commissioner may detain or place an embargo upon sardines by marking or tagging the same, giving notice that such sardines were packed in violation this chapter and that they have been detained or embargoed, and warning all persons not to remove or dispose of the same by sale or otherwise until permission for removal or disposal is given by the commissioner or the court. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove or dispose of such detained embargoed article by sale or otherwise without such permission. Orders for detention or embargo issued under this section shall not be considered to be licensing or an adjudicatory proceeding, as those terms are defined by the Maine Administrative Procedure Act.

The commissioner or duly authorized agent of the commissioner detaining such sardines shall promptly petition the proper officer of the District Court or the Superior Court within whose jurisdiction the sardines are detained for a libel for condemnation of

such sardines, the procedure of which shall conform, as nearly as may be, to the procedure for libelling intoxicating liquors.

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4 the court finds that the sardines were packed 5 in violation of this chapter, or regulations issued 6 thereunder, it shall enter a decree that they shall 7 be destroyed at the expense of the claimant thereof, 8 under supervision of the commissioner, or any of his 9 duly authorized agents, and all court costs and fees, 10 and storage and other proper expenses shall be 11 the claimant. 	23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33 34	This new draft will result in a loss of dedicated revenue to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources of approximately (\$25,300) annually. This estimate is based on the proposed reduction of the inspection tax on sardines, kippers and steaks. In addition, this new draft will generate an increase in dedicated revenues to the Maine Sardine Council in the amount of \$50,000 a year. This additional revenue will be derived from a proposed increase in the sardine excise tax and is intended to fund personnel within the Maine Sardine Council to implement the current grading program.

Currently, the sardine industry pays for its own inspection costs and is stringently monitored by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The sardine industry pays an inspection tax of between 8¢ and 20¢ per case of sardines and 5¢ to 13¢ per case of kippers and steaks to fund this program. They also are subject to a sardine excise tax of 30¢ per case to fund the activities of the Maine Sardine Council. The Maine Sardine Council proposes to change the sardine inspection program in 3 basic ways.

- 1. The Maine Sardine Council will cost share the inspection program between the sardine industry and the General Fund. The sardine inspection tax would be reduced from the current level of 15¢ to 20¢ per case rate to 8¢ to 15¢ per case.
- 2. The Maine Sardine Council will take over from the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, the grading program for sardines, steaks and kippers. The Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources will retain its authority to embargo goods.
- 3. The sardine excise tax will increase by 5¢ per case to a total of 35¢ per case to fund personnel within the Maine Sardine Council to implement the grading program.

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
