11 12 13	Amend the amendment in subsection 2 by striking out all of paragraph C (page 1, lines 28 to 32 in amendment) and inserting in its place the following:
14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23	'C. A person who delivers, receives, accepts, notarizes or witnesses an absentee ballot, other than his own absentee ballot, for compensation other than reasonable reimbursement for actual meals and mileage. This paragraph does not apply to a governmental employee handling ballots in the course of his official duties or any person who handles absentee ballots before the unvoted ballots are delivered to the municipality or after the voted ballots are returned to the clerk.

1 STATEMENT OF FACT

- This amendment clarifies that the only persons who may handle absentee ballots and be paid for doing so are:
- 5 l. Governmental employees such as municipal 6 clerks and their deputies or assistants, federal post 7 office employees and the Secretary of State; and
- 8 Anyone who handles the blank ballots before 9 the ballots are delivered to the municipality for 10 distribution to the voters, or after the ballots are filled out by the voters and returned to the clerk. 11 These people include the people hired to prepare 12 13 deliver the blank ballots, and the people who deliver the voted ballots, on which the clerk has written "OK", to be counted, as well as those who count the 14 15 16 ballots.
- This amendment also clarifies that any other person who accepts compensation, other than reasonable reimbursement of actual meals and mileage, for handling ballots commits a Class D crime.
