IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

- 1 AN ACT Concerning High Speed Chases.
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- 3 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 4 follows:
 - Sec. 1. 29 MRSA §2501-A, sub-§3, as amended by PL 1983, c. 181, §1, is further amended to read:
- 7 3. <u>Eluding an officer.</u> Whoever, after being 8 requested or signaled to stop, attempts to elude a law 9 enforcement officer by driving a vehicle at a reckless

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rate of speed which results in a high-speed chase between the operator's vehicle and any law enforcement vehicle using a blue light or siren is guilty of a Class B C crime. If any person suffers any serious bodily injury, as defined in Title 17-A, section 2, subsection 23, as a result of the operator's attempt to elude a law enforcement officer as described in this section, that operator commits a Class E B crime.

- Forfeiture. Any violation of subsection 3 or shall also constitute a civil violation for which forfeiture proceedings impoundment and be initiated. Ιf the vehicle is abandoned, lost stolen, it shall be disposed of in accordance with Title 25, chapter 401. If the owner of the vehicle is unknown, the State shall perfect title to that vehicle in accordance with Title 15, section 5823.

Sec. 3. Department of Public Safety study. The Commissioner of Public Safety shall investigate and develop new techniques for the apprehension of the operator of a motor vehicle engaged in a high-speed chase, in which the vehicle is attempting to elude a law enforcement officer or to pass a roadblock, in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 29, section 2501-A, subsections 3 and 4. The commissioner may consult other states currently investigating techniques of stopping a violator and may consider such issues as civil liability of the municipality or State under the Maine Tort Claims Act, Title 14, chapter 741, and other applicable provisions of law.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill seeks to reduce the number of high-speed chases by increasing the penalty for the offense of attempting to elude a police officer, by providing for the forfeiture of a vehicle used in a high-speed chase, and by authorizing the Department of Public

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
