Report. Resolved: That the department submit its report of the study, including any necessary implementing legislation, to the First Regular Session of the 114th Legislature no later than January 1, 1989; and be it further

Implementation. Resolved: That the department shall design a program and promulgate rules by which the expansion of the numbers and kinds of reimbursable mental health professionals may be implemented by July 1, 1989.

18 STATEMENT OF FACT

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29 30 Currently, only counselors and therapists who are members of certain professions may be reimbursed for their services by 3rd-party sources. Many other very competent professionals from closely related fields are not paid by these funding sources, and yet their services are very valuable to mental health centers and to the clients they serve. This bill requires the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation to study the issue of expanding the numbers and kinds of professions which may be reimbursed. The department shall make its report by January 1, 1989, and shall implement the expansion program by July 1, 1989.

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
