STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT Concerning Marine Recreational Fisheries.

4 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 5 follows:

6 12 MRSA §6051, as enacted by PL Sec. 1. 1977, с. 7 661, §5, is amended to read:

8 §6051. General department activities

Page 1-LR4597

1 The department, under the direction of the commissioner, may conduct or sponsor programs for research 2 3 and development of commercial, marine recreational and 4 anadromous fishery resources and other marine resources of 5 the State which may include biological, chemical, technological, hydrological, processing, depuration, 6 7 marketing, financial, economic and promotional research 8 and development. The department may carry out these programs within the department, in cooperation with other ·9 10 state agencies, and federal, regional and local 11 governmental entities, or with private institutions or 12 persons.

13 Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §6052, sub-§4, §§A and B, as 14 enacted by PL 1977, c. 661, §5, are amended to read:

15 A. Providing information on stock levels and 16 environments of commercially <u>and recreationally</u> 17 valuable marine and anadromous fish organisms;

18 B. Solving particular problems that relate to the 19 state's State's commercial, marine recreational and 20 anadromous fishing industry; and

STATEMENT OF FACT

22 Over the past 2 decades, striped bass, mackerel, tuna, groundfish and rainbow smelts have become increasingly 23 important as marine recreational fishery resources. More 24 25 recently, the influx of large numbers of bluefish into Maine coastal waters has generated a substantial recreational fishery. Recent expansion of the federal Dingle-Johnson Act of 1950 (Wallop-Breaux Aquatic Resource 26 27 28 29 Trust Fund) mandates that a portion of these federal funds 30 be spent on marine recreational fisheries' programs. Coastal states throughout the nation are now making use of 31 32 these funds to develop and manage marine recreational 33 fisheries. This bill is intended to clarify the role of 34 the Department of Marine Resources with respect to marine 35 recreational and anadromous fisheries.

Page 2-LR4597

Section 1 of the bill authorizes the commissioner to conduct or sponsor programs related to anadromous and marine recreational fisheries. This section clarifies the authority of the commissioner to make sure of federal funds (Wallop-Breaux) which must be expended on marine recreational fisheries.

7 Section 2 further clarifies the authority of the 8 department to engage in research programs involving 9 recreationally valuable marine and anadromous fish 10 organisms.
