IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT Pertaining to Radar Detectors.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

29 MRSA \$1254-A is enacted to read:

\$1254-A. Prohibiting use of devices on motor vehicles upon highways to detect presence of radar

It is unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the highways of this State when that

1 vehicle is equipped with any device or mechanism to emission of radio microwaves in detect the electromagnetic spectrum, which microwaves 3 are employed by police to measure the speed of motor 5 vehicles upon the highways of this State for enforcement purposes. A person may not possess, use or offer for sale any such device or mechanism as 7 described in this section and the presence of any such 8 9 device or mechanism in or upon a motor traveling upon the highways of this State shall constitute prima facie evidence of a violation of this 10 11 12 section. The State need not prove that the device in 13 question was in an operative condition or being operated. Any such electronic or mechanical designed for detecting police speed moni 14 device 15 detecting police monitoring 16 equipment is declared contraband and shall be seized and destroyed by the State. Any person who violates this section is guilty of a Class E crime. 17 18

The sole purpose of radar detection devices is to alert the speeding motorist of the presence of police radar so that the motorist can avoid apprehension. In effect, a radar detection device enables the motorist to violate speed laws with little risk of being detected and apprehended.

For this reason, the use of radar detection devices greatly impedes the police from effectively enforcing speed limits. It is felt that this leads to increased death and injury caused by traffic accidents and increased consumption of fuel during a time of decreasing fuel supplies.

This bill prohibits the possession, use or sale of radar detectors, authorizes their seizure and destruction by the State and provides that a violation of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 29, section 1254-A, results in a Class E crime.
