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- use pesticide product which contains no more than 3% active ingredients and which is applied undiluted by homeowners to control pests in and around the family dwelling and associated structures. For the purposes of this definition and section 1471-U, subsection 5, petroleum solvents shall not be considered active ingredients.

 use pesticides to any person upon payment of a fee of

 year. Any person licensed to distribute restricted
 use pesticides shall be considered licensed to
 distribute general use pesticides without any
 additional fee. All fees collected under this section
 shall be deposited in the Board of Pesticides Control
 Special Fund.
- 3. Records; reporting. Any person licensed to distribute general use pesticides shall keep and maintain records of annual pesticide sales and shall 23 24 25 make them available on request to the board. Those 26 records shall include the name of the pesticide, the 27 28 concentration of active ingredients, the quantity sold 29 and such other information as the board may require by rule, and shall be kept on a calendar year basis. The 30 records shall be kept for 2 years after the end of the 31 calendar year. The board, by rule, may require submission of an annual written report on sales of general use pesticides or a subcategory of them. The board may not require recordkeeping on the sale of household use pesticide products. 32 33 34 35 36
- 4. Violations; penalty. Any person required to be licensed under subsection 1 who sells general use pesticides without a license commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture not to exceed \$500 may be

25 FISCAL NOTE

26 Enactment of this bill would:

- 1. Result in an increase in dedicated revenue to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, Board of Pesticides Control, in the amount of \$88,000 for fiscal year 1988-89. This estimate is based on the anticipated revenue from the proposed increase in the pesticide registration fees, as well as the general use pesticide license fees; and
- 2. Result in an allocation to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, Board of Pesticides Control, in the amount of \$88,000 for fiscal year 1988-89.'

1 STATEMENT OF FACT

The original bill was a result of a study of pesticides regulation by the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture. It provided funds for the creation of 3 5 2 full-time positions in the Board of Pesticides Control: A person to direct review of the toxicological effects of pesticides and advise the 7 board, the department and the general public about any risks associated with their use; and a person to prepare newsletters and brochures to inform 9 10 11 applicators, dealers and the general public about board activities, pest problems and appropriate control measures. It also authorized the board to provide a grant to the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Maine System to create 2 temporary positions for persons to revise old and 12 13 14 15 16 develop new training materials for both private and 17 18 commercial applicator certification.

The amendment retains the two positions at the Board of Pesticides Control and responds to a 19 20 recognized lack of information about the sale and use of general use pesticides, those pesticides which are not restricted to use by certified applicators. Data from 1984 showed that only about 23% of agricultural 21 22 23 24 25 pesticide sales in Maine were restricted use pesticides and, nationally, agricultural sales were 26 only 36% of pesticide sales. The amendment adds a 27 provision for the licensing of general use pesticide 28 dealers. Dealers who sell only household use pesticide products will not need a license. Specific 29 30 exemptions are included for a number of items in general use by the general public, such as pet 31 32 supplies, disinfectants and insect repellents. The board and the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources are expected to cooperate in the implementation of this program by providing a means for general use pesticide dealers to get their 33 34 35 37 licenses at the same time they obtain other licenses 38 39 from the department.

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The amendment removes the General Fund appropriation. Funding is obtained from 2 sources within the Board of Pesticides Control Special Fund: \$22,000 from a proposed license fee to be collected from general use pesticide dealers and \$66,000 from a \$10 increase in pesticide registration fees and removal of the \$10 fee reduction for small volume pesticides. Funding for the grant to the Cooperative Extension Service is reduced accordingly to \$22,000.
