AN ACT to Appropriate Funds for Mapping of Sand and Gravel Aquifers.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

21 This bill is a result of a study of pesticide 22 regulation by the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture. The significant Sand and Gravel Aquifers 23 Mapping Program was initiated in 1981 to accurately 24 25 define sand and gravel aquifers and describe their characteristics. The maps show aquifers capable of 26 27 yielding more than 10 gallons per minute and other 28 pertinent information widely used make to environmentally sound siting decisions, to show areas 29 the development of 30 suitable for community or industrial water supply wells and to locate valuable 31 32 resource areas for protection through local land use 33 ordinances.

34 Significant sand and gravel aquifer maps are 35 available for the southern portion of the State and 36 are being prepared for eastern and northern Maine.

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Field work, however, has not been completed in the central portion of the State. These funds will allow the completion of mapping in the Old Town, Lincoln and Millinocket areas in the summer of 1988. Additional funding will be needed in the future for mapping in the Houlton, Rangeley, Kingfield and Dover-Foxcroft areas.

8 Without additional funding, the State will lose 9 the participation and dollar-for-dollar match of the 10 United States Geological Survey.

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
