AN ACT to Amend the Harassment Law.

5	<pre>Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §4651, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 515, §1, is amended to read:</pre>
7 3 9	2. <u>Harassment</u> . "Harassment" means any repeated act of intimidation, harassment, physical force or threat of physical force whether-or-not-performed

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- under color of law, directed against any person, 1 2 family or their property or advocate with intention of causing fear or intimidation or to deter 3 free exercise or enjoyment of any rights or privileges 4 secured by the Constitution of Maine and the United 5 6 States Constitution. This definition does not include any act protected by the constitutional guarantee of 7 8 free speech.
- 9 Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §4659, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 10 1987, c. 515, \$1, is repealed and the following 11 enacted in its place:
- 12 arrest. Notwithstanding Warrantless statutory provision to the contrary, an arrest for 13 criminal violation of an order or consent agreement 14 may be made without warrant upon probable cause 15 whether or not the violation is committed in the presence of the law enforcement officer. The law enforcement officer may verify, if necessary, the 16 17 18 19 existence of a protective order by telephone or radio communication with a law enforcement agency with 20 21 knowledge of the order.

- 2. Agency procedures. Law enforcement agencies shall establish procedures to verify the effective 30 31
- 32. dates and terms of any recorded protection order.
- 33 3. Officer training. Law enforcement agencies 34 shall provide officers employed by them with an 35 education and training program designed to inform the officers of the problems of harassment, procedures to deal with these problems and the provisions of this 36

	1 2 3	chapter. The amount and degree of officer training, beyond the distribution of information, shall be determined by each local law enforcement agency.
	4 5 6 7 8	4. Officer responsibilities. Whenever a law enforcement officer has reason to believe that a person has been a victim of harassment, the officer shall immediately use all reasonable means to prevent further harassment, including:
	9 10 11 12	A. Remaining on the scene as long as he reasonably believes there is a danger to the physical safety of that person without the presence of a law enforcement officer;
	13 14	B. Assisting that person in obtaining medical treatment necessitated by an assault;
	15 16 17 18	C. Giving that person written notice of his rights, which shall include information summarizing the procedures and relief available to victims of harassment; or
	19 20	D. Arresting the harassing party with or without a warrant pursuant to section 4659, subsection 2.

	24 25 26 27 28 29	The purpose of this bill is to amend the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 337-A, which refers to protective orders for harassment and to repeal Title 17, chapter 93-C, so that law enforcement responsibilities and procedures in regard to harassment will be clarified and made workable.
