AN ACT to Establish Child Care Availability for Individuals in the Substance Abuse Treatment System.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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STATEMENT OF FACT

Child care for persons receiving treatment for alcohol or substance abuse is virtually nonexistent in this State, resulting in a strong impact on treatment effectiveness.

This bill will fund 3 pilot programs in the State to provide child care in residential and outpatient settings of alcohol and substance abuse treatment, and will measure the impact on treatment and cost effectiveness by eliminating traditional responses to child care needs such as foster care.

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
