7 8 9 10 11	The Interagency Task Force on Affordable Housing is established to provide for a comprehensive approach to affordable housing for low and middle-income persons, to propose recommendations that could significantly reduce this problem and to address the problems and issues described in §4553-B.
13 14 15 16 17	1. Task force membership. The task force shall consist of 15 members. The Governor shall appoint the members of the task force who are not state employees or Legislators. The task force shall consist of the following:

	12 13	2. Chairman. The chairman of the task force shall be the Director of the State Planning Office.
	14 15 16 17	3. Terms; vacancies. The terms of membership shall be as provided in this subsection. Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority responsible for the appointment.
	18 19 20 21	A. The term of membership for the state employees and the housing authority directors shall be the period of time during which they occupy the position represented on the task force.
	22 23 24 25	B. The term of membership for municipal officials and state Legislators shall be for the term of office to which they have been elected or appointed.

- 3 The task force shall have the following responsibilities and duties. 4
- 5 Study and analyze the problem. The task force shall study and analyze the problem of the lack of 6 7 affordable housing for low and middle-income people. The task force shall: 8
- 9 Α. Determine the areas currently with 10 greatest need for affordable housing in the State and the reasons for the lack of affordable housing 11 12 in these areas;
- 13 B. Determine the housing needs of the State for the remainder of the century and the areas in 14 15 which the greatest demand for housing will occur;
- 16 Identify the major obstacles to providing housing for low and 17 affordable middle-income 18 persons in the State; and
- 19 Analyze the cost factors of housing, land, labor, 20 including, but not limited to, capital, materials and their relationship to each other to determine whether state policies can 21 22 23 reduce any of the cost factors.
 - Study approaches in other states. The task force shall study the approaches that have been effective in other states to provide affordable housing to low and middle-income people.
- 28 3. Analyze the problem of homelessness. The task force shall analyze the problem of the homeless in the 29 State, including areas in which the problem exists, efforts to solwe the problem and the means necessary 30 31 32 to address significantly this issue.
- 4. Analyze need for system of coordination. The task force shall analyze whether there is a need for a 33 34 formal system of coordination and cooperation between 35

- the Maine State Housing Authority, municipal housing authorities and municipalities, and the coordination of the policies and programs of these organizations.

 In addition, the task force shall analyze alternatives to a formal system of coordination and cooperation between these organizations.
- 7 5. Develop comprehensive plan. The task force 8 shall develop a comprehensive plan by which affordable 9 housing can be made available to low and middle-income 10 people throughout the State and which makes the most 11 effective use of resources available to achieve this 12 goal.
- 6. Review federal housing policies. The task force shall review federal housing policies and housing money at least annually with respect to their impact upon the State. In this review, the task force shall consider the means by which state policies could alleviate negative impacts of federal policies or policy changes, including funding policies.
- 7. Monitor and evaluate the availability and cost of housing. The task force shall monitor and evaluate the availability and cost of housing throughout the State and issue an annual report with respect to the results of its findings.
- 8. Evaluate implementation and impact of the comprehensive plan. The task force shall evaluate the implementation and impact of the comprehensive plan and propose any changes deemed necessary.
- 29 §4553-C. Report; comprehensive plan
- 30 The task force shall report its findings annually
 31 with respect to the provisions in section 4553-B and
 32 any other information it deems necessary. This report
 33 shall be provided to the Governor and the Legislature
 34 with any proposed implementing legislation by January
 35 l5th of each year.
- 1. Comprehensive plan. The task force shall prepare a comprehensive plan, including any necessary implementing legislation to be presented to the

- Governor and the Second Regular Session of the 114th Legislature no later than January 15, 1990.
- 3 Legislative findings. The Legislature 4 finds that there are significant shortages of affordable housing in different areas of the State. 5 6 The lack of affordable housing affects a substantial proportion of the State's citizens and is producing a 7 very serious and adverse impact upon them. Not only does the shortage of affordable housing create severe 8 9 10 hardships for Maine citizens, it also contributes to 11 ever-increasing creation ο£ class an working-poor people in Maine. 12 In addition, the 13 housing shortage contributes to low self-esteem and 14 the significant social problems that stem from this 15 problem.
- The social and economic dislocation caused by rapidly escalating housing costs needs immediate attention. This problem requires careful analysis and a comprehensive approach. A piece-by-piece approach may create inconsistent policies and solutions that fail to make the best use of the State's resources.

This bill establishes an Interagency Task Force on Affordable Housing to develop a comprehensive approach to the housing shortage in Maine. The task force is composed of the directors of 5 state agencies, directors of municipal housing authorities, 2 municipal officials, 2 housing developers, а representative of a community action agency and legislators.

The task force will:

- 1. Review the problem in Maine, including the areas in which the problem occurs currently, the expected needs for housing by the year 2000 and the major obstacles to providing affordable housing;
 - Examine the role and degree of coordination and cooperation among the state, municipalities, and
