Residential treatment centers desiring to provide services to children in need of placement shall submit the necessary budget data to the Children's Residential Treatment Committee Committee for Interdepartmental Coordination of Services to Children and Families on or before May-15th by April 1st of each year.

The committee shall, in establishing rates, take into account the importance of recruiting and retaining qualified child care staff in the current labor market. The rates established by the committee shall provide funds adequate to meet increased staff costs, including increased base salaries for residential child care staff. The Department of Human Services is directed to increase Medicaid ceiling levels for the following facilities to allow adequate funding of staff costs to meet competitive wages statewide:

1	A. Residential treatment centers;
2 3	B. Intermediate care facilities for the mentally
3 4 5	retarded; and C. Waiver homes, as approved by the Bureau of Mental Retardation.

Funds expended for out-of-state placement in fiscal year 1988-89 shall be no greater than 75% of funds expended in fiscal year 1987-88. Funds expended for out-of-state placement in fiscal year 1989-90 shall be no greater than 50% of funds expended in fiscal year 1987-88.

25 26 27 It directs that contracts for residential treatment services for these children be finalized by May 1st of 28 29 each year, thus allowing the residential treatment 30 facilities to plan and budget their operation on an 31 orderly basis. The bill requires that the Committee 32 for Interdepartmental Coordination of Services 33 Children and Families, in its contract process, 34 ensures that adequate funding is available to permit 35 treatment centers, group homes residential community services to attract and retain qualified 36 37 staff to their agencies.

Finally, the bill contains an appropriation provision to fund 3 additional day treatment

facilities in unserved or underserved geographic areas to avoid removal of children in these areas from their homes for appropriate treatment; provide funds for a demonstration program for younger children in need of intensive mental health treatment services; and, hopefully, avoid institutional placement at a later time.

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
