IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Implement Certain Recommendations of the State Compensation Commission.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 5 follows: 6

3 MRSA §2, first ¶, as amended by PL Sec . 1. 1985, c. 737, Pt. C, §§2 and 6, is further amended to 8 read: 9

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1 Each member of the Senate and House of 2 Representatives, beginning with the first Wednesday of 3 December,  $\frac{1986}{1988}$ , and thereafter, shall receive  $9_7000$   $\frac{10,000}{10}$  in the first year and \$6,000 December, 4 in the 2nd year of each biennium, and shall be paid 5 6 for travel at each legislative session once each week 7 at the same rate per mile to and from his place of 8 abode as state employees receive, the mileage to be 9 determined by the most reasonable direct route, except 10 that Legislators may be reimbursed for tolls paid for travel on the Maine Turnpike provided they have a receipt for payment of the tolls, such tolls to be 11 12 13 reimbursed where Legislators use the Maine Turnpike in traveling to and from sessions of the Legislature or 14 in performance of duly authorized committee assignments. Each Legislator is entitled to mileage on 15 16 17 the first day of the session, and such amounts of his 18 salary and expenses at such times as the Legislature may determine during the session, and the balance at 19 20 the end thereof.

23 member of the Senate and Each House of Representatives shall be entitled to a meal allowance in the amount of \$26 \$30 and a housing allowance in 24 25 the amount of \$34 \$38 for each day in attendance at 26 27 sessions of the Legislature and for each day he occupies overnight accommodations 28 away from home 29 either immediately preceding or immediately following attendance at daily sessions of the Legislature. In 30 lieu of the meal and housing allowance, each member 31 shall be entitled to a daily meal allowance in the 32 33 of <del>\$2</del>6 \$30 and actual daily amount mileage allowances in an amount up to but not exceeding \$34 34 \$38 per day. Each member of the Senate shall also 35 36 receive an annual allowance for constituent services 37 in the amount of \$1,000. Each member of the House of Representatives shall also receive an annual allowance for constituent services in the amount of \$500. 38 39

29 In addition to the salary paid for the first and 30 2nd regular sessions of the Legislature, when a special session is called, the members of the Senate 31 32 and House of Representatives shall each be <del>paid</del> \$55 33 compensated \$100 for every day's attendance, expenses 34 and mileage as aforesaid.

35 3 MRSA §162-B, as enacted by PL 1983, Sec. 5. 36 c. 862, §§5 and 6, is amended to read:

## 37 §162-B. Salaries of constitutional officers

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38 Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, the 39 salaries of the following state officials shall be at

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the salary ranges indicated in this section. 1 At the 2 of initial appointment the salary of the time 3 Secretary of State<sub>7</sub> the State Auditor and the 4 Treasurer of State shall be set at the first step of the official's respective range. 5 At the time of appointment, the salary 6 the initial salaries of Attorney General and the State Auditor shall be set at 7 Step E of his their salary range. The Legislative Council may adjust the salary of each official by one 8 9 10 step for each year of continuous service after the 11 initial appointment to office.

12 The salary ranges shall be as provided by law for 13 confidential employees who take the salary increase 14 option instead of state payment of retirement 15 contribution. No other state salary may be paid. 16 These officials are not eligible for state payment of 17 employee retirement contributions.

18 1. <u>Range 87.</u> The salary of the following state
 19 officials and employees shall be within salary range
 20 877-but-shall-not-exceed-Step-G-in-that-range:

- 21 A. Secretary of State; and
- 22 B. Treasurer of State.

23 2. <u>Range 88.</u> The salary of the State Auditor 24 shall be within salary range 88, but shall not 25 exceed <u>be less than</u> Step 6 <u>E</u> in that range.

26 3. <u>Range 90.</u> The salary of the Attorney General 27 shall be within salary range 90, but shall not be less 28 than Step E and shall not exceed Step 6 in that 29 range.

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

2 This bill implements the recommendations of the 3 State Compensation Commission made in their 2nd 4 interim report as follows:

5 The State Compensation Commission has recommended 6 7 changes in legislative compensation effective with 7 the seating of the 114th Legislature, including: increasing first regular session salaries by \$1,000 to 8 9 \$10,000; increasing the compensation received by 10 legislative leadership to 60% above regular 11 compensation for the presiding officers, 30% above regular compensation for the majority and minority 12 13 leaders and 15% above regular compensation for the 14 assistant majority and assistant minority leaders; 15 establishing a compensation differential of 5% above regular compensation for committee chairmen and 2 1/2% 16 17 above regular compensation for minority "lead-people"; 18 authorizing special session compensation at the rate per legislative day; increasing meals 19 \$100 of allowance by \$4 to \$30 per day and the lodging, or 20 21 mileage in lieu of lodging, allowance by \$4 to \$38 per 22 increasing the annual constituent day; service allowance for Senators by \$500 to \$1,000; and creating a waiver provision from mandatory membership in the 23 24 25 Maine Legislative Retirement System for those members 26 with a tax conflict.

27 The commission recommended has eliminating 28 statutory language that prohibits the constitutional officers from reaching the top 2 steps of their salary ranges. Also, the commission has recommended that the 29 30 31 State Auditor, like the Attorney General, be allowed to start at Step E of the salary range in recognition of the professional certification requirements for the 32 33 34 position.
