Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine a follows:

2. Violation. Any person, firm or corporation which violates this section commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture not to exceed \$100 may be adjudged.

## 15 STATEMENT OF FACT

 This new draft is consistent with the intent of the original bill which is to aid in the enforcement of out-of-doors burning laws requiring the person who is doing the burning to have the permit at the scene of the fire and to produce the permit on the demand of those authorized to enforce the fire laws. This applies only to fires in municipalities, plantations and village corporations; the requirement does not apply to fires in unorganized territory.

This new draft locates the requirement in a separate section from the fire permit conditions and requirements in order to clarify that possession and production of the permit are not conditions of the permit, but requirements of the law. Violation of permit conditions is currently a Class E crime. In addition, this section applies only to those who were actually issued a fire permit. Anyone who burns out-of-doors without obtaining a permit commits a Class E crime and, since that person has no permit, would not come under this section.
