## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Revise the Solid Waste Law.

3 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 4 follows:

Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §1310-W, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 557, §5, is repealed.

Sec. 2. Application. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 1, 8

section 302, this Act is effective on October 22, 1987 and any action taken by the county commissioners intended to apply within the unincorporated townships and plantations within their jurisdiction pursuant to fitle 38, section 1310-W, is invalid.

#### STATEMENT OF FACT

7 This bi11 repeals the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 1310-W which was passed in the First 8 Special Session of the 113th Legislature and which 9 1Ò granted county commissioners the authority to pass 11 ordinances regulating solid waste disposal in thë 12 unorganized territories. Such ordinance authority overlays and duplicates existing authority held by the 13 Maine Land Use Regulation Commission, LURC. 14 Any solid waste disposal facility proposed to be sited in the unorganized territories is already subject to the 15 16 17 jurisdiction, not only of the Départment ôÉ Environmental Protection, but also the Maine Land Use 18 19 Regulation Commission. The State is facing àń 20 impending solid waste disposal crisis đuë tö the 21 shortage of available landfill capacity for disposal 22 of ash and other residue from waste from energy 23 proper that The facilities serve Maine towns. 24 management and disposal of solid waste within the 25 State are required in order to safeguard the public health, welfare and the environment. Sites suitable for environmentally sound waste disposal are in 26 27 in thät 28 limited supply and it is imperative environmentally sound landfill proposals proceed expeditiously through the lengthy Department of Environmental Protection and Maine Land Use Regulation 29 30 31 32 Commission licensing proceedings required by state law. This bill will not diminish the State's control over the licensing of solid waste disposal facilities 33 34 35 nor will it limit the Maine Land Use Regulation 36 Commission's ability to oversee the unorganized 37 territories in addition thè department's to 38 regulation. This bill will prévent county 39 from seeking to make the unorganized commissioners 40 territories within their jurisdictions off limits to 41 the development of needed solid waste disposal
