The programs enacted by this bill will require additional General Fund appropriations in fiscal year 1990: Health insurance subsidy, \$1,000,000, increased Aid to Families with Dependent Children standard of need and Medicaid benefits, \$450,000, general assistance, \$338,000, and other miscellaneous increases, \$175,000.'

### STATEMENT OF FACT

8

This amendment replaces the original bill. It is the minority report of the committee. It proposes a revision of the public assistance system by establishing the ASPIRE program, Additional Support for People in Retraining and Education. It makes several other changes in current law related to public assistance.

Section 1 authorizes the Department of Human Services to participate in the determination of eligibility for various subsidies of telephone costs for low-income people as established by the Public Utilities Commission.

21 Section 2 authorizes the Department of Human Services to seek a waiver from federal regulations regarding elibility requirements for Aid to Families 22 23 24 with Dependent Children benefits, AFDC. If the waiver is approved, recipients with children as young as 3 years old would be required to register in the ASPIRE 25 26 program in order to be eligible for AFDC benefits. 27 28 Current law would require recipients with children as young as 6 years old to register in the ASPIRE 29 Certain exemptions which exist in the 30 program. 31 current federal laws and regulations would still apply to the recipients with the younger children. Under this amendment, recipients who volunteer are given priority for participation in ASPIRE support and services. Participation for mandatory registrants shall be contingent upon the availability of ASPIRE 32 33 34 35 36 37 support and services.

- Section 2 also enacts a mandatory registration requirement for the Family Services Program, FSP, for teenage parents who are recipients of AFDC. Failure to register and actively participate in the program will not result in ineligibility for basic AFDC benefits; however, supplemental support services, such as child care and transportation, may be withheld pending participation in the program.
- 9 Sections 3, 4, 5, and 8 establish the ASPIRE 10 program. The components of this proposal, under this 11 amendment, are as follows.
- 12 l. The goal of ASPIRE is to assist people in 13 getting a job which pays well enough to support their 14 family without public assistance.
- 2. It shall be administered by the Department of Human Services and jointly operated by the Department of Human Services, the Department of Labor, and other state agencies having ASPIRE responsibilities.
- 19 3. The Department of Human Services and the 20 ASPIRE recipient shall enter into a contract to 21 provide ASPIRE support and services to help the client 22 meet program goals.
- 23 Services and support shall be provided under the AFDC and the Job Training Partnership Act, JTPA 24 The program shall be jointly operated by 25 programs. the Department of Labor and the Department of Human 26 Services. The State will be divided into areas where the Department of Labor and the Department of Human Services jointly provide services in areas where the 27 28 29 Department of Labor provides services under contract with the Department of Human Services. 30 31
- 32 5. Transitional support services such as 33 transportation and child care may be provided to 34 ASPIRE recipients who become employed and lose their 35 AFDC eligibility.

- The ASPIRE program authorizes the Department 2 Human Services to provide extended medical assistance for ASPIRE recipients who become employed 3 and lose their eligibility for Medicaid. The medical 5 assistance shall be the same as if the family were receiving cash assistance under AFDC. Families with 6 7 income under 110% of the federal poverty income guidelines will not be required to pay any premium, 8 9 deductibles or copayments. Families with income of 10 110% to 150% of the federal poverty income guidelines 11 will pay a portion of the premium, based on their Families with income over 12 earnings. 150% of the federal poverty guidelines will not receive medical 13 assistance. The extended medical assistance shall be 14 available for up to 12 months after the recipient 15 AFDC eligibility. extended 16 The medical assistance program sunsets June 30, 1989. The Department of Human Services will develop a plan to 17 18 provide extended health insurance coverage beginning July 1, 1989 and shall present this plan to the Joint 19 20 Standing Committee on Human Resources by January 15, 21 22 1989.
- 7. The Department of Human Services shall notify the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources of any request for waivers from the Federal Government concerning the ASPIRE program.
- 27 Section 6 authorizes the Department of 28 Services to establish demonstration projects to 29 reimburse municipalities for a portion of 30 reasonable administrative costs of their general 31 assistance program.
- The appropriation in this amendment also provides funds for additional staff in the Fraud Investigation Unit and the Child Support Enforcement Unit.
