IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Extend the Uses of the Potato Marketing Improvement Fund.

4 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 5 follows:

6 Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §973, as amended by PL 1987, c. 7 319, §2, is further amended to read:

8 §973. Potato Marketing Improvement Fund

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There is created a fund to be known as the Potato 1 2 Marketing Improvement Fund, to which shall be credited 3 all funds received by the commissioner from any source 4 for the development and implementation of an improved 5 storage, packing and marketing program. Any money credited to the Potato Marketing Improvement Fund from 6 7 the issuance of bonds on behalf of the State for 8 agricultural development shall be used only for the ġ purposes of state loans as prescribed by section 10 974-A, to provide assistance to farmers on technical aspects of the design and construction of storage, 11 packing 12 and marketing facilities and to pay the administrative costs of processing loan applications, 13 14 to the extent that the costs exceed the fee for costs established by section 15 administrative 974-A. 16 Repayment of these loans and interest subsection 2. 17 thereon shall be credited to the Potato Marketing Improvement Fund to be available for making additional 18 19 state loans for the same purposes, except that any interest earned on the cash balance of the fund may be 20 21 used for the grants authorized by section 975.

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Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §975 is enacted to read:

23 §975. Grants

24 any portion of the interest earned A11 or or 25 accruing on the cash balance of the Potato Marketing be Fund may used for grants 26 Improvement to firms, 27 individuals, corporations other or organizations for any of the following purposes: 28

Partial cost of project. To pay an amount not 29 1. 30 to exceed 50% of the total cost of any project. The purpose of any project shall be to provide equipment and facilities for washing and otherwise preparing potatoes for packing, such equipment and facilities including, but not limited to, wells, pressure pumps, 31 32 33 34 35 plumbing and necessary auxiliary equipment. The total amount granted under this subsection for any single 36 37 year shall not exceed 25% of the aggregate interest earned and attributable to funds from the issuance of 38 39 state bonds;

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2. Research projects. To partially or fully fund specific research projects, the purpose of which is to study and assess technical problems experienced with new and retrofitted storage facilities, and to develop means of dealing with such problems, or to examine, monitor and develop new technologies for the storage and handling of potatoes; and

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System design. To provide assistance for the designing of a system, and for the purchase or construction of facilities associated with a system, for cull and off-grade potatoes to be gathered from individual storage and packing sheds and transported to central facilities where potatoes may be further sorted and provisions made for their sale and transportation to markets, or for their safe disposal.

16 commissioner, promulgated The by rule, in 17 accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, shall establish criteria 18 19 for the allocation of grants.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill permits the use of interest earned on 22 the cash balance of the fund established by the Maine 23 Revised Statutes, Title 7, section 973 to be available for 3 distinct purposes. First, this interest would be available for direct grants to farmers for wells and related washing systems for those who presently have no such facilities. The grants would be limited to 50% of the total cost of the drilling of the well and installation of necessary plumbing and auxiliary equipment. The number of grants per year would be limited so as not to unduly deplete the fund, and would be given on a first-come first-served basis to farmers submitting appropriate plans and otherwise meeting qualifications. The increased use of washing equipment would greatly enhance the market image of Maine potatoes. It is anticipated that many farmers

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1 in marginal economic circumstances would derive the 2 greatest use of the grant funds, as they have not yet 3 been financially able to purchase such equipment on 4 their own.

5 Second, the interest would be available to fund research grants for the purpose of assessing problems 6 7 experienced with new and retrofitted storages. For 8 example, one type of sprayed insulation commonly used 9 in storage construction several years aqo is undergoing an aging process that results in diminished 10 11 effectiveness. Research is needed to determine why 12 the problem exists and what can be done to arrest or 13 otherwise deal with the problem. Also, continuous 14 examination and monitoring of new technologies is 15 contemplated with respect to assessing the feasibility of implementing these innovations in new or existing 16 17 storages.

18 Third, the interest would be available to operate a gathering system for cull potatoes. 19 These waste 20 potatoes are generally sold to the starch plant in 21 Caribou, but because of the cost constraints on 22 transporting these potatoes, only farmers within 25 23 of of Caribou dispose miles can culls in this 24 fashion. Disposal of culls presents a problem to 25 farmers in other areas of the county and culls not 26 properly disposed of create breeding grounds for potato disease. This bill proposes a gathering system 27 for culls which would substantially alleviate the problem of potato disease originating in cull piles. 28 29 30 The gathering system would involve several central 31 collection stations for various areas of the county to which farmers would haul culls. 32 These culls would 33 later be transported to the starch plant in Caribou.

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
