## STATE OF MAINE

### IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Create the Railroad Preservation and Assistance Act and to Provide for Annual Track Inspections.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

7 Sec. 1. 23 MRSA c. 615 is enacted to read:

- 2 §7101. Short title
- This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "State Railroad Preservation and Assistance Act."
- 5 §7102. Findings of fact
- The Legislature makes a finding of fact that a viable and efficient rail transportation system is necessary to the economic well-being of the State.
- 9 The Legislature makes a further finding of fact 10 that the State must take active steps to protect and 11 promote rail transportation in order to further the 12 general welfare.
- 13 §7103. Railroad Preservation and Assistance Fund
- 14 1. Deposit of funds. All revenue derived from tax levied pursuant to Title 36, chapter 361, 15 Treasurer of State 16 shall be deposited by the 17 Railroad separate account be known as the to 18 Preservation and Assistance Fund.
- 2. Legislative approval of budget. Expenditures from the Railroad Preservation and Assistance Fund are subject to legislative approval in the same manner as appropriations from the General Fund.
- 23 3. Use of funds. Subject to the Civil Service
  24 Law, money in the fund may be expended to hire
  25 employees and to defray other costs authorized by law
  26 for the Department of Transportation, Bureau of
  27 Transportation Services as follows:
- To conduct studies relating to the economic 28 impact of rail transportation on 29 the State 30 cost-benefit analyses with including associated 31 the possible retention or loss of individual 32 lines;

### STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to create the Railr	oad
Preservation and Assistance Act. Specifically, t	his
bill creates a fund to be used to protect, prese	
and promote rail transportation in the State.	The
fund will be financed from the excise tax on railr	oad
gross receipts.	

The fund would be administered by the Department of Transportation, and could be used to conduct studies to determine the effect on the State's economy of losing or maintaining rail service; to survey track conditions; to acquire, lease or maintain rail lines; and to provide grants and loans.

14 This bill also provides for 3 full-time railroad 15 inspectors.

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
