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1	CHAPTER 60
2	RAILROAD PERSONNEL
3	SUBCHAPTER I
4	GENERAL PROVISIONS
5	§4140. Declaration of purpose
6 7 8 9	The purpose of this chapter is to provide for the safety of property, railroad workers and the general public by requiring certain railroad personnel to demonstrate adequate training and competency.
10	§4141. Definitions
11 12 13	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
14 15 16	1. Applicant. "Applicant" means the individual who wishes to act as a brakeman, carman, conductor, flagman, locomotive operator or train dispatcher.
17 18	2. Board. "Board" means the Board of Licensure of Railroad Personnel.
19 20	<u>3. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the</u> Commissioner of Professional and Financial Regulation.
21 22	4. Department. "Department" means the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation.
23 24 25 26 27	5. Railroad personnel. For the purposes of this chapter, an individual is acting as one of the following personnel if that individual performs the duties of that personnel classification, without regard to the individual's actual job title.
28 29 30 31 32	A. "Brakeman" means a person who applies the brakes to stop a train during the normal operation of the train and who assists the locomotive operator in making observations of the track and other conditions during the operation of a train.
33 34 35	B. "Carman" means a person who inspects railroad cars for compliance with the standards of the Federal Railroad Administration and certifies or

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withholds certification of the suitability of a car for service.

C. "Conductor" means a person who is responsible for all movements of a train including the consist of a train and the location of cars on the train, who keeps and implements all work orders for operation of the train and who is responsible for manifests showing the cargo of the train.

D. "Flagman" means a person who is responsible for stopping vehicular traffic at a railroad crossing and for signaling the locomotive operator when it is safe to continue.

E. "Locomotive operator" means a person who operates a locomotive by controlling the locomotive throttle and who is responsible for signaling the train's approach to a rail-highway crossing.

F. "Train dispatcher" means a person who controls the operation of all train activity on track within a given territory.

#### SUBCHAPTER II

### BOARD OF LICENSURE OF RAILROAD PERSONNEL

§4145. Board of licensure; appointment; vacancies; removal; compensation

26 1. Establishment and membership. The Board of 27 Licensure of Railroad Personnel, as established by Title 5, chapter 379, shall be within the department and shall be composed of 9 members, one of whom shall 28 29 be the commissioner, one of whom shall be 30 the Commissioner of Labor or the Commissioner of Labor's representative, one of whom shall be a state railroad 31 32 33 inspector and 6 of whom shall be appointed by the 34 Governor.

35 Two of the members appointed by the Governor shall represent railroad labor, 2 shall represent railroad 37 management and 2 shall be representatives of the 38 general public.

39 <u>2.</u> Terms of appointment. Members appointed by 40 the Governor shall be appointed for terms of 3 years.

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1 To the first board established under this chapter, the 2 Governor shall appoint 2 board members for terms of 3 one year, 2 for terms of 2 years and 2 for terms of 3 4 years.

5 Any appointive member of the board may be removed from 6 office for cause by the Governor.

3. Compensation. The members of the board shall be compensated according to the provisions of Title 5, chapter 379, provided that expenses do not exceed the fees collected by the board. If the fees to be collected under this chapter are insufficient to pay the expenses provided by this section, the board members shall be entitled to a pro rata payment in any years in which those fees are insufficient.

4. Vacancies. Any vacancy on the board caused by death, resignation or removal of any member shall be filled by the appointment of a person, with the same qualifications as the board member being replaced, to hold office during the unexpired term of the member whose place is being filled.

21 5. Chairman. Annually, in the month of January, 22 the members of the board shall choose one of their 23 members to act as chairman.

24 §4146. Administrative provisions

25 <u>1. Employees. The commissioner may appoint,</u> 26 <u>subject to the Civil Service Law, such employees as</u> 27 <u>may be necessary to carry out this chapter. Any</u> 28 <u>person so employed shall be located in the department</u> 29 <u>and under the administrative and supervisory direction</u> 30 of the commissioner.

31 2. Meetings. The board shall hold regular 32 meetings semi-annually and such other meetings as it 33 determines necessary. The board shall keep correct 34 records of all its proceedings and is authorized to 35 make rules deemed necessary for carrying out this 36 chapter and to provide for reciprocity of licensing 37 with similar boards of other states which maintain 38 standards at least equal to this State.

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§4147. Board of licensure; powers and duties

1. Powers. The board shall administer and enforce this chapter and evaluate the qualifications of applicants for licensing. The board may examine witnesses and administer oaths and shall investigate or cause to be investigated any complaints made to it or any cases of noncompliance with or violation of this chapter.

2. Rules. The board may adopt, in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, rules relating to qualifications of personnel to carry out the policy of this chapter, including, but not limited to, rules relating to licensing and establishment of adequate standards of training for persons licensed to act as brakemen, carmen, conductors, flagmen, locomotive operators or train dispatchers on any railroad operating in the State.

3. Hearings. Hearings may be conducted by the board to assist with investigations, to determine whether grounds exist for suspension, revocation or denial of a license or as otherwise deemed necessary to fulfill its responsibilities under this chapter. Hearings shall be conducted in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter IV, to the extent applicable.

27 4. Records. The board shall keep such records 28 and minutes as are necessary to the ordinary dispatch 29 of its functions.

30 <u>5.</u> Contracts. The board may enter into contracts 31 to carry out its responsibilities under this chapter.

32 <u>6. Reports. No later than August 1st of each</u> 33 year, the board shall submit to the commissioner, for 34 the preceding fiscal year, its annual report of its 35 operations together with such comments and 36 recommendations as the commissioner deems essential.

SUBCHAPTER III

## LICENSE

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39 §4148. License required; issuance

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1 <u>1. License required. Licenses shall be required</u> 2 <u>as follows.</u>

- A. No person may act as a brakeman, carman,
   conductor, flagman, locomotive operator or train
   dispatcher in the operation of a railroad unless
   licensed by the board to do so.
- B. No railroad company may allow a person to act
  as a brakeman, carman, conductor, flagman,
  locomotive operator or train dispatcher unless
  licensed by the board to do so.
- 11 2. Penalties. Penalties shall be as follows.
- 12 A. Any person who acts as a brakeman, carman, 13 conductor, flagman, locomotive operator or train 14 dispatcher and who is not licensed to do so is 15 guilty of a Class D crime.
- 16 B. Any railroad company which allows any person to act as a brakeman, carman, conductor, flagman, locomotive operator or train dispatcher who is not licensed to do so is guilty of a Class D crime.
- 20 <u>3. Application; qualifications. The board shall</u> 21 issue a license to any person who files a sworn or 22 attested application for a license and who meets the 23 following qualifications:
- A. Passage of an examination approved by the
   board, covering the rules of operation of the
   railroad for whom that person is employed;
- 27 B. Successful completion of classroom and shop 28 instruction approved by the board in the skills 29 which the position requires;
- 30C. Successful completion of a training program31approved by the board, which provides actual or32simulated experience in the job for which the33person seeks licensure; and
- 34 D. Such other requirements as may be necessary to
  35 assure the safety of property, railroad workers
  36 and the general public. Those requirements shall
  37 be established by the board through rulemaking
  38 pursuant to Title 5, chapter 375.
- 39 4. License. Any person who receives a license of

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1	authority to act as a brakeman, carman, conductor,
2	flagman, locomotive operator or train dispatcher shall
3	have the license available for inspection any time
4	that person is performing the duties allowed by the
5	license.
6	5. Term of license. License terms are as follows.
7	A. A license shall expire annually on December
8	<u>31st or on such other date as the commissioner</u>
9	<u>determines. Notice of expiration shall be mailed</u>
10	<u>to each licensee's last known address at least 30</u>
11	<u>days in advance of the expiration of the license.</u>
12	<u>The notice must include any requests for</u>
13	<u>information necessary for renewal.</u>
14	Licenses may be renewed up to 90 days after the
15	date of expiration upon payment of a late fee of
16	\$10 in addition to the renewal fee. Any person
17	who submits an application for renewal more than
18	90 days after the licensing renewal date shall be
19	subject to all requirements governing new
20	applicants under this chapter.
21	B. Each license renewal must be accompanied by
22	evidence of continuing education or other
23	requirements as established in rule by the board.
24	C. The board shall adopt rules establishing
25	requirements for a temporary license within the
26	<u>scope of this chapter.</u>
27	§4149. Disciplinary actions
28 29 30 31 32	1. Complaints. The board may order an investigation of a complaint on its own motion or on written complaint filed with it regarding noncompliance with or violation of any section of this chapter or of any rules adopted by the board.
33	2. Disciplinary actions; grounds. The board may
34	suspend or revoke a license pursuant to Title 5,
35	section 10004. In addition, the board may refuse to
36	renew or the Administrative Court may revoke, suspend
37	or refuse to renew any license issued under this
38	chapter on any of the following grounds:
39 40	A. The practice of any fraud or deceit in obtaining a license;

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B. Any negligence, incompetency or misconduct in 1 the performance of the work for which the licensee 2 3 is licensed; or 4 C. Violation of this chapter or of any rule of 5 the board. 3. Reinstatement. The board, for reasons it determines sufficient, may reinstate any person whose 6 7 license has been revoked, providing 6 or more members of the board vote in favor of that reissuance. 8 9 10 §4150. Fees 1. Amount. Application fees for licenses or renewals may be established by the board in amounts 11 12 13 which are reasonable and necessary, but not to exceed 14 \$100. 15 Multiple licenses. The board may waive part 2. all of a fee or establish a special fee for 16 individuals receiving more than one license. 17 3. Deposit of fees. All fees received by the board shall be paid to the Treasurer of State to be used for carrying out this chapter. Any balance of 18 .19 20 fees shall not lapse, but shall be carried forward as a continuing account to be expended for the same 21 22 purposes in the following fiscal years. 23 24 STATEMENT OF FACT

The Legislative Task Force on Railroads heard repeated concerns about untrained or undertrained personnel operating trains. This bill requires certain railroad personnel to receive classroom and experiential training and to be licensed for the job they perform. Successful completion of approved railroad company training programs would qualify an applicant for a license.

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
